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

Moses BARROW Settled Here

MOSES BARROW (son of THOMAS, JR.) of NORTH CAROLINA and GEORGIA

- -1<mark>5-1755 MOSES BARRO</mark>W was born "on FISHING CREEK" in Edgecombe Co., N.C. (an area later cut off into Halifax Co.). Date of birth in the records of a direct descendant, Mrs. FRANCES B. WOOD of Macon, GA.
- Moved to his father's newly purchased plantation on NEW RIVER in Onslow Co., N. C.
- His father, THOMAS BARROW, JR. (son of THOMAS, SR. who died testate in SOUTHAMPTON Co., VA in 1763) died naming MOSES in his Will.
- His mother, ELIZABETH (nee ATKINSON) BARROW died in Onslow County, soon after giving birth to a daughter named SALLY.
- MOSES was taken to the plantation of his Uncle SOLOMON ATKINSON in HALIFAX/EDGECOMBE Co. area where he was raised by his Grand-mother ATKINSON.
- 1776-1781 MOSES served during the American Revolution in Capt. Bacot's 10th Reg't under Col. Abraham Sheppard (NSDAR Patriot Index, p. 40).
 - MOSES appears on the U. S. Census in EDGECOMBE Co., N.C., p. 54, with two males under 16 yrs and 2 females, all ages, giving rise to the question that he may have been married twice or that he had married a widow with three children. He had five known children by his wife MARTHA (in other records she has been identified as MILDRED POWELL). See "BARROW An Early Southern Family", Vol. II, No. 3, p. 23, for Bible records of his known children.
- 7-31-1784 MOSES BARROW "of EDGECOMBE Co., N.C." purchased 187 acres "on FISH-ING CREEK and DEEP CREEK" from THOMAS WELLS (DB 4:118), wit: THOMAS HODGES, RICHARD PUTNEY. MOSES had 4 slaves in the 1790 Census.
- 10-7-1785 MOSES sold his 187 acre tract to his brother, JAMES and wife ANN "of EDGECOMBE Co." (DB 4:305), wit: JOSEPH HART, BENJAMIN HART. After his brother, JAMES, moved to GEORGIA in 1789, we find that JAMES and wife ANN "of BURKE Co., GA" sold this 187 acre tract to MICAJAH EDWARDS "of EDGECOMBE Co." on August 13th, 1793 (DB 7:248).
- 6-25-1793 MOSES BARROW, living in HALIFAX Co., N. C. (where his brother, JACOB, had died in 1790 leaving a widow, MILLEA (nee SMITH) and 4 small children), sold "Lot No. 25" in the Town of TARBOROUGH in EDGECOMBE County (DB 7:221), being joined by his wife MARTHA ______ in this sale.
- 12-26-1795 MOSES BARROW, his wife MARTHA, and his sister-in-law cosigned a deed in HALIFAX Co., N. C. We have not researched this deed, at this writing, and do not know why MILLEA (nee SMITH) BARROW may have had an interest in this tract of land or vice-versa. After this date, MOSES and MARTHA, with three small children (JACOB b. 1-22-1792) and twins (WILLIAM THOMAS and MARY DREW b. 10-15-1795), moved to a large plantation on KEGG CREEK in WASHINGTON Co., GA, and had 2 additional children: MILDRIDGE SMITH (b. 8-30-1799) and JAMES (b. 12-25-1801).
- 12-28-1801 MOSES BARROW died intestate. His brother, JAMES of BALDWIN Co., GA, served as the executor of MOSES' estate. His widow, MARTHA, married CHARLES THOMPSON, by whom she had several children before she died about 1812.



BARROW of BEAUFORT County, N. C.

FREDERICK BARROW, of BEAUFORT County, North Carolina, made his Will on January 17th, 1827 which was proven at the BEAUFORT County May Term of Court. Among his children we find a son named HENRY BARROW and a daughter NANCY (nee BARROW) BOYD.

HENRY BARROW served as his father's Executor. Then, we find HENRY named as the Executor of the Will of JOHN H. BOYD dated May 30th, 1828 whom we presume was the husband of NANCY BARROW as he names his wife "NANCY BOYD" to receive his entire estate except for \$50.00 he bequeathed to his sister PENNY WARREN. From the Court records, we find that HENRY BARROW did serve as the Executor of JOHN H. BOYD'S estate with an account of Sales and a list Notes being filed in Court on June 24th, 1828. One THOMAS BARROW appears on the list of Purchasers when the Perishable Estate was sold on June 21st, 1828.

One JESSE BARROW and one THOMAS BARROW served as Witnesses to FREDERICK BARROW'S Will on 1-17-1827.

One JESSE BARROW married MARY PERKINS with the Bond dated 12-27-1826. We have speculated that JESSE and THOMAS BARROW were closely related to FRED-ERICK BARROW of BEAUFORT, all of whom we cannot presently identify until further research is accomplished.

BARROW in GEORGIA

Ms. CAROL J. BARROW further states: "...JOHN PORTER BARROW appears in the 1850 Census as being 19 years of age, enrolled as a student at Emory College at Oxford, Newton Co., Georgia. According to his tombstone in Clinton, Jones County, GA, he died in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania about 1856-57."

Note: See "BARROW - An Early Southern Family", Vol. I, No. 1, pp 39-40 for a record of the family of JOHN PORTER BARROW. He was the son of WILLIAM THOMAS BARROW (b. 10-15-1795) and his wife SARAH D. BILLINGSLEA who were married in MORGAN County, GA on July 18th, 1821. His grandfather was MOSES BARROW (b. 10-15-1755) of EDGECOMBE/HALIFAX Cos., North Carolina who moved his family to Georgia, settling in WASHINGTON County on KEGG CREEK where he died on 12-28-1801.

WILLIAM THOMAS BARROW had a twin sister named MARY DREW BARROW, about whom we know very little. He had one where sister named MILDREDGE (or MILLEDGE or MILLIEA) SMITH BARROW. Again, we have speculated that she may have been named for MILLEA SMITH of HALIFAX Co., N.C. who was the wife of the older brother of MOSES named JACOB BARROW. MILLEA (called "MILLEY") SMITH was the daughter of DREW SMITH and we have noted that MOSES and his wife MARTHA gave the names of both DREW and SMITH to both of their own daughters, suggesting that MARTHA was somehow closely related to the DREW SMITH family, though proof of it has eluded our researchers. A handsome portrait of JOHN PORTER BARROW appears in No. 3, p. 1 (ibid, op. cit.).

As a result a number of the lines found in the 1916-1940 <u>Lineage Books</u> have been superseded by more recent research associated with higher standards of scholarship.

The DAR encourages anyone who consults the 1916-1940 Lineage Books to also refer to the corrections to the Lineage Books found in the NSDAR Patriot Index, Vols. 1, 2 & 3 and the "Correction List" which is published in various issues of the NSDAR Magazine.

Foreword

THE Continental Congress of 1936 voted that the work of compiling the Lineage Books of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution be done in the office of the Registrar General instead of in the office of the Historian General. Since that time seventeen volumes have been compiled containing numbers 149,001 to 166,000.

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Foreword

Soon after entering upon the duties of the office of Historian General three years ago, there was brought to my attention the need and the demand for a further index to the Rolls of Honor (Ancestor's Index) in the Lineage Books. More than sixty volumes of Lineage Books had been issued by the National Society and there was a general index for volumes 1-40 only. This had been published in 1916 by Mrs. Samuel A. Ammon and dedicated to Pennsylvania Daughters of the American Revolution.

Personally, I assumed the task of making a card index for the volumes to be issued during my term of office. A card index for the intervening volumes, 41-60, has been made by my able assistants in the office of the Historian General; the work of preparing the cards for the printer has been done in the same way.

The Daughters of the American Revolution in West Virginia, wishing to assist in the publication of this work undertaken by one of their number, have contributed to the National Board of Management \$1,500 through their State Regent, Mrs. Robert J. Reed.

This index to volumes 41-80 of the Lineage Books contains references to volume and page, where are to be found a record of the services of men and women who assisted in establishing American independence and the names of their descendants admitted to the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution from the year 1902 to 1910.

My part in this work has been a great pleasure; and with the hope that the book may be of real value to those interested in preserving the early history of our nation, this volume is presented to the National Society as one of the many achievements of the brilliant administration of Mrs. Anthony Wayne Cook, President General.

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LAND LOTTERY RECORDS

The 1805 Lottery is the only lottery where we have a complete list of all who registered to draw land. In the other five lotteries we have only a complete record of those who drew land. However, in Baldwin County four books in which the names of those who registered to draw in the lottery of 1820 and 1821 were listed. These four books do not comprise all who registered unfortunately, but they are nevertheless helpful insofar as they go because they show the names of some of the residents of Baldwin County who do not appear in the census of 1820 because they were not heads of family.

ceased Moses Barrow's children. (as of May 9, 1986, the brothers or sisters of our Rev.
James Barrow is not known to me.). The three sons of Elizabeth Atkinson and Thomas Barrow Jr Moses, Jacob, James, all
probably came to Georgia after the revolutionary war. James, born 31 Jan; 1757, was the
youngest of the three. (the ages of the other two or their sister Sally is not known to me as of 9 May 1986.)
James was in the revolutionary war and was one of those who remained through the winter at Valley Forge, Pa. in 1777-1778, about 27 miles west of Philadelphia, with Gen. George
Washington's Continental Army. There the Army of about 11,000 endured several months of
bitter suffering, living in crude log huts that they had built themselves. They had lit- tle food and hardly enough clothing to protect themselves from the cold. On 23 Dec. 1777
Washington wrote: "We have this day no less than 2,873 men in camp unfit for duty because
they are barefooted and otherwise naked". More than 3,000 soldiers died during this period. James came to Georgia in Nov. 1789 and in 1792 purchased 1,500 acres of land on bark camp
creek in Burke, now Screven, County. He later moved to Hancock county, Ga. and then to
Baldwin County, Ga. in 1802, where he bought a large plantation, living there until he died in 1827. His will, dated 20 March 1827 & probated 10 March 1828 names Jacob Barrow

This 1813 Tax List - the first available - has added significance because of the loss of Georgia's census for 1790, 1800, 1810 and the fact that the deeds for Baldwin County prior to the Civil War have been lost.

Taxes were paid on land in Baldwin County unless otherwise noted and when land was in Baldwin and another county, only the letter "B" is used to denote Baldwin County.





Captain Charles Barrow was the son of Jacob Barrow whoes line was: Moses Barrow; Thomas Barrow, JR; Thomas Barrow, SR; Thomas Barrow (1) and [possibly John Barrow].

Jacob was athe older brother of (Rev) James Barrow, my great-great grandfather.

Jacob was a successful business man in Milledgeville including being the post master. For some reason, he moved to Columbus and owned a hotel near the steam boat landing in the main part of town. He owned quite a bit of valuable property. He died in 1854 and we believe that he is buried in Columbus but we can find no record of such. There are no copies of 1854 Columbus newspapers in the Columbus library.

He had several children including Charles. We found two articles on Charles' death in the Columbus papers. The micro film of the first article, The Columbus Inquirer is very poor quality and only about half the article is readable. The other paper's article is much easier to read but is not as long an article as the other. I have tried to put the two together to tell the story.

It is very interesting indeed.

CAPTAIN CHARLES BARROW

Captain Charles Barrow was the son of Jacob Barrow, the son of Moses Barrow, the son of Thomas Barrow, JR; Thomas Barrow, SR; Thomas Barrow(1); [John Barrow?].

Moses Barrow died on December 28, 1801 at his home near Keg Creek and the village Deep Step in Washington County, GA leaving his wife Martha [Smith?] Barrow and children: Jacob (1792), twins William and Mary Drew (1795), Mildridge Smith (1799) and my great-great grandfather, (Rev) James Barrow (Dec. 25, 1801). James ("Jimmy") was only three days old when his father, Moses died and his older brother Jacob was nine.

Martha soon married a Mr. Charles Thompson and the children, other than Jacob, went to live with their mother and step-father near High Shoals, Ocoee County, GA. Jacob lived with his wealthy uncle, brother of Moses, James Barrow of Milledgeville, Baldwin County, GA. Both Moses and brother James were Revolutionary War veterans from North Carolina. James gave Jacob the best education possible and treated him as his own son.

Martha died in 1812 and her Barrow children went to live with their uncle James. Jacob was then 19 years old and as soon as he became of legal age he became the guardian of the younger children. Jacob drew land in the 1826 land lottery for "Orphans of Moses Barrow, Revolutionary War Veteran." James moved to one of the Carroll County, GA lands that the orphans drew in the lottery in late 1830s and became a Baptist preacher.

Jacob was a very successful business man in Milledgeville including becoming Post Master. For some reason he later moved to Columbus, GA and owned a hotel and considerable other properties near the steamboat landing in the main part of town. Many of the boat captains were guest of the hotel. He had several children including son Charles. Jacob died in Columbus in 1854 and is evidently buried there although we can find no record of this. There are no copies of 1854 Columbus papers available in the Columbus libraries.

Charles became a captain on the Columbus Police force. He was killed while in the line of duty on Christmas night, 1871. The microfilm from one of the Columbus papers, *The Columbus Enquirer*, a weekly paper is in very poor condition and difficult to read the entire article. The other paper, a daily,(unfortunately I have misplaced the name of it) is much better to read but is a much condensed story. We have done our best to combine the two articles in an effort to cover as much of the tragedy as we can. The condensed article follows:

"HOMECIDES MONDAY NIGHT—There were two men killed in Columbus at _? Monday night, and a third was so badly if not mortally wounded ? a record of which as public journalist we very much regret being called upon to make.

The first of these unpleasant ? occurred between the hour of 10 and 11 o'clock, Monday night, in which policeman Charlie Barrow, which in the discharge of his

official duties received his death at the hands of George Layfield. A young man who about a week ago arrived in the city from St. Louis. The facts of the case as well as we can gather them are briefly these: Young Layfield while under the influence of liquor had been guilty of improper language and threats at the confectionary store of L G. Strupper. Mr. Strupper had ordered him away and it is said that Layfield threatened the life of Mr. Strupper. The later gave a signal and poor policeman Barrow and his partner, McMichael took Layfield in custody. Policeman Barrow told him [Layfield] that he did it unwillingly and would use his exertions to turn him loose. They were proceeding with him to the guard house and just as they had reached the "(this is all that we could read of the *Columbus Enquirer* article. We continue filling in with the article from the daily paper.)

"Just as they reached his brother's bakery Mr. Layfield attempted to enter. Barrow caught him. Layfield drew his pistol and fired four times. Barrow had caught the weapon in his hands endeavoring to take it away. One ball struck him in the forehead, glanced and entered the top of the scull; another his mouth and passed through the base of the brain. Barrow was carried to his home and died several hours after. He was buried last afternoon [In the old Columbus cemetery on Rose Hill] the regular police force acting as pall-bearers. He was a good and reliable officer. For awhile he was a member of the Confederate army.

Layfield escaped to Alabama. Policemen McEachen and Foram arrested him there. When taken he did not know Barrow was dead.

The Coroner's Jury returned a verdict that deceased came to his death from effects of shots from a pistol in the hands of George Layfield. The shooting occurred at 10½ o'clock Monday night."

We do not know how Layfield was punished but my son, Lew Barrow a lawyer in Columbus will try to check this out. I had been told that Charles Barrow was a Captain on a river boat but had doubted this and had always felt that he was a Police Captain.
