played rare courage in establishing a thriving college in the wilderness. It was an achievement unmatched anywhere in Georgia at that time. Many farmers of the surrounding area moved to the village to give their children the advantages of these educational opportunities. As a result, the town literally grew up around the college. It was incorporated in 1859, only two years after the college was chartered. The original charter of the town of Bowdon intimately reflected the presence of the college. It not only placed a modified ban on the selling of intoxicating liquors but stated "That no person shall under any pretense" furnish a student "with any kind or quantity of spiritous or intoxicating liquors." ³⁶

By 1860 Bowdon seemed headed for prosperity. It had ten stores, two livery stables, two tanyards, and a large number of shops. During the latter part of 1860, however, a disastrous fire swept through the town and destroyed three-fourths of the business houses. At this time its population was 304, all of whom were white except two free Negroes. Carrollton's white population exceeded that of Bowdon by only seventeen persons.³⁶

To compliment its educational establishment, the community of Bowdon was supplied with ample religious accommodations. At the time of its incorporation in 1858 it had a Methodist Episcopal Church, a Methodist Protestant Church, and a Missionary Baptist congregation which had been inaugurated under the leadership of the Reverend James Barrow, who had previously founded the Eden Baptist Church near the town. Eden was the first church of that denomination in the western part of the county. The Bowdon Baptist Church was not organized until 1860. A resident of Bowdon, William Goggans, who was wounded in the battle of King's Mountain during the Revolution, was said to have been the first member of the Baptist denomination in the county.³⁷

In the county as a whole as well as in Bowdon, the Methodists far outnumbered the Baptists during the period before the Civil War. Founded in 1828 as part of the Coweta and Carroll Mission, Concord Methodist Church was perhaps the first organized religious group in the county. Its prime mover was James Baskin, who had been born in South Carolina and served as a Methodist minister in Jackson County.

By 1850 there was a total of twenty-eight churches in the county, twenty of which were Methodist. Only eight were Baptist. Methodist church property had a total value of \$6,000; the Baptist property was slightly in excess of \$2,000. The Methodists were the first to organize The Receding Frontier

a church in Carrollton, holding their services in the courthouse until 1847, when they completed a building on the north side of Alabama Street where the first community cemetery later was established. Among the early Methodist circuit riders was James Lupo, whose home was near Stripling's Chapel (a church south of Carrollton named for another circuit rider, David Stripling). Traveling by horseback, he required four weeks to complete his circuit, after which he remained at home with his family only a few days before beginning a new tour.

Another circuit rider, Bill Timmons, lived near Old Camp a few miles west of Carrollton, although he lies buried at Smyrna, in another community. Timmons was particularly noted for his great piety. Among his self-imposed ascetic rules was his refusal to eat bread baked with soda. All six of his sons followed in their father's footsteps and became Methodist ministers.³⁸

Only rarely could these early Methodist ministers devote their full time to preaching. Augustus C. Reese was an ordained Methodist minister who devoted his life largely to teaching school. J. M. Blalock was a successful merchant and at one time held the office of Ordinary. Matthew Griffin at times held the office of clerk of Superior Court.³⁹ Others engaged in farming and preached on Sundays and during summer revivals which were invariably scheduled for August after their crops were cultivated.

The Baptists have left far more numerous records which reflect early religious activities than have the Methodists. Because of their congregational organization, the minutes of their monthly conferences give a vivid description of the character of religious society in a frontier community. About the time that Carroll was organized, a schism developed among the Baptists in Georgia which, in 1837, resulted in two distinct groups of this sect. These were the Missionary Baptists and the Primitive or "Hardshell" Baptists. The latter group was opposed to making contributions to foreign missions and they held no brief for an educated ministry, believing that God called men to preach irrespective of their occupation and learning, and that the Holy Spirit instructed and inspired the preacher at the time he delivered himself of the sermon. Their opposition to foreign missions was based largely on practical economics and they would not even support the Baptist Indian Mission at Withington, in the Alabama Creek country. One Baptist minister stated that, before 1813 when missions came into vogue, he could make a tour of his churches and collect fifty to sixty dollars a year for his services, but now he

Born on Christmas Day, December 25th, 1801, JAMES' father, MOSES, died three days later. JAMES' mother, MARTHA, soon married CHARLES THOMPSON, by whom she had several additional children.

JAMES was named for his Uncle JAMES BARROW of Baldwin Co., GA who took charge of his brother MOSES' estate, serving as the Guardian of the children's interest in the slaves and real estate until they became of age.

JAMES' older brother, JACOB, was entitled to draw in one of the Georgia Land Lotteries and drew a "prize" for land in CARROLL County which he later deeded to JAMES. JAMES settled on this land where he lived the rest of his life, though his ministry required him to travel extensively.

JAMES married LUCINDA BIVINS at Milledgeville in Baldwin Co., GA, on January 2nd, 1825. They lived for a period of time in Upson and Talbot Cos. prior to settling in Bowdon, GA. Their children, according to the records of Mr. H. MARTIN CHAMBERS of Chamblee, GA, a direct descendant and a Charter member of the Barrow Family Assn. of America, are as follows:

- i. MILDRED BARROW, b. c. 1827 in Upson Co., GA, married GIDEON SMITH, son of GABRIEL and NANCY SMITH, on 10-20-1844.
- ii. SARAH JANE BARROW, b. 1829 in Upson Co., GA, married CHARLES SMITH, son of GABRIEL and NANCY SMITH, on 11-14-1852 in Carroll County.
- iii. MARY EMILY BARROW, b. 1830 in Upson Co., GA, married JOHN M. BURT on 8-4-1850 and moved to Cullman Co., AL.

LUCINDA BIVINS BARROW died 12-21-1873. Rev. JAMES BARROW died 7-30-1884. They are buried in the Bowdon Baptist Church Cemetery, Bowdon, Georgia.

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He married Lucy Bivins at Milledgeville, Baldwin County, Ga. on 2 Jan. 1825 and must have moved to Upson County, Ga. that same year because the Upson County, Ga. tax records show that he owned and paid tax on $202\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land in Upson County, Ga. for the year 1825. He continued to pay tax to Upson County, Ga. thru 1830 and moved to Talbot County, Ga. in 1831-32. While in Upson County, Ga. he lived about 6 miles north of Thomaston, Ga. and it was there that he was babtised at antioch Baptist Church, by Rev. Jacob King, on the 3rd Sunday in April 1827 and, it was there, in July, 1830 that he was "licensed to preach". Antioch Baptist Church was then located on, what is now, Fair Haven road, .3 miles east of Ga. rd. # 36. In 1859, after James had moved to Talbot County, Ga., the church members took the Church building apart, board by board, moved it on wagons, and rebuilt it on it's present site, at the corner of Barnesville and Willis road's, about 3 miles from it's first location. The "original structure" is still in use but changes and additions have been made over the years. (A St. Thimothy Baptist Church is now in Antioch's old location on Fair Haven road.) (HMC)



In offering the reprint of the Official Register of the Land Lottery of 1827 (Grantland & Orme, Milledgeville, 1827) Miss Houston is making generally available information at present obtainable only from the MS. records of Georgia or from a very limited number of copies of the original edition, none of which is to be found in the public libraries of Atlanta or, as far as I can learn, in the public libraries of the state.

The law providing for this lottery names white males above 18, who had been residents of the state for three years, Revolutionary soldiers, widows of Revolutionary soldiers, orphans, and others, who had not drawn land in previous lotteries, as eligible for participation. With the exception of the first class—citizens above 18—the ground of qualification is shown. More than 15,000 names are listed, including approximately 1,500 Revolutionary soldiers and 1,500 soldiers of other wars.

Since there are no census reports of Georgia except the Federal which are still in MS. and on file in Washington, D. C., and since the tax digests, none of which has been published with the exception of a volume of ten counties prior to 1818, are so incomplete, the value of this record from both the historical and the genealogical standpoints is readily discernible.

Georgians are deeply indebted to Miss Houston for this valuable piece of work.

From THE PUBLISHER



The matter of presenting the Official Register of 1827 has been an expensive luxury, but a joy nevertheless. The book itself is made of extracts from the "draws," the original of which is filed in the office of the Secretary of State of the State of Georgia. The "draws" were listed by counties and by days, beginning the 6th of March, 1827, and continuing through the 25th of May. They were then grouped into numbers, 31 in all, and printed by the State Printers Grantland & Orme, the first Official Register of Land Lottery of Georgia of 1827.

Of the small number printed one was purchased by Benjamin Born. So much did he prize his copy that he dressed the pig skin for the cover which safely guards the valuable record to the present day. The book was made ready for republication by supplying the index and explanations. A list of the names of Revolutionary soldiers, widows of Rev. Sol., soldiers of other wars (1785-1827), and widows of these soldiers have been listed and may be published later as a separate volume. All indications of service and eligibility are given in the original.

In order to prove that I held the only complete copy, I published pictures of various pages from my copy, inquiring for duplicates. I found a fragment of a copy in the possession of Mr. Louis A. Moore. This he kindly entrusted to me for checking up on my copy. I have included in this introduction a copy of the law for this lottery, Georgia Laws of 1825 page 119; also, a copy of two of the certificates. The map of Georgia nearest the date of the lottery was that of 1829 found in Sherwood's Gazetteer. This was furnished by the courtesy of the Library of Congress.

I hereby certify that exclusive of the preceding pages and the pages of the index—that is to say, the book proper, is a true and correct reprint of the original Official Register of the Land Lottery of Georgia of 1827.

AN ACT

Amendatory of an act passed the ninth June, eighteen hundred and twenty-five to dispose of and distribute the lands lately acquired by the United States for the use of Georgia, of the Creek nation of Indians by a treaty [made] and concluded at the Indian Springs on the twelfth day of February, eighteen hundred and twenty-five.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Georgia in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the words "Immediately preceding the passage of this act" in the act passed the ninth day of June, eighteen hundred and twenty-five, be and the same are hereby repealed, and the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and twenty-six be adopted in lieu thereof.

- Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, by the authority aforesaid, That it shall be the duty of the justices of the inferior court of the respective counties of this state, or majority of the same to cause the above section to be carried into effect.
- Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That the persons appointed by the inferior courts to carry into effect the provisions of this amendatory act, shall insert in the oaths laid down in the before recited act, the words the first day of September, eighteen hundred and twenty-six, instead of the words "the passing of this act" wherever the latter occurs.
- Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That all men of like residence who have been wounded and disabled in the late wars with Great Britain or the Indians, shall be entitled to one additional draw other than they are allowed by the provisions of the before recited act, in consequence of said wound and disability and the persons appointed to carry this act into effect shall administer the following oath to said persons, to wit: I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I was wounded in the late wars with Great Britain and the Indians, by which wound I am disabled—instead of the oath prescribed in said section.
- Sec. 5. Be it further enacted, That all illegitimate children shall be considered and placed on the same footing with orphan children under the provisions of this act, and shall be entitled to a draw or draws in like manner.
- Sec. 6. Be it further enacted, That nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to interfere with the rights of persons who have given in their names for chances in the contemplated land lottery, and that so much of the before recited act as militates against this act, be and the same hereby repealed.

MONTGOMERY, ALA.

The republication of LOTTERY LISTS, 1827—there having been only a few copies originally issued for official use—will make available to students data of great value.

This newly accessible material will mean much both to the historian and the genealogist. Population movements through Georgia form a most fascinating study of subsequent development in other more western states, and this list of land allotments in west Georgia shows many families early settled in Virginia and the Carolinas, who later made marked contributions to the history of the Mississippi Valley.

The section of the state including these lands was ceded by the Indian Springs Treaty of February 12, 1825, which was not ratified, and on account of which Gen. McIntosh was put to death by a delegtaion of his own nation, at his home in the present Carroll county, May 1, 1825. The transfer of this territory to the state was officially consummated by the treaty made at Washington City, January 24, 1826, when an agreement was made that the Creek Indians should vacate on or before January 1, 1827. This treaty was not recognized by Gov. Troup, and he ordered the survey into districts by the terms of the Indian Springs agreement. The Federal government and the state became involved in a serious controversy which was not amicably adjusted until the holding of the conference at Fort Mitchell, (Alabama) November 15, 1827, when the United States agreed to pay the Creek Indians \$28,000 for the territory.

Muscogee, Troup, Coweta, Lee, and Carroll counties were then created to embody the newly acquired territory. They were named to honor the Muscogee people, from whom it was acquired; Gov. George McIntosh Troup; the birthplace in the Indian nation, of Gen. William McIntosh; Gen. R. H. Lee, of Virginia; and Charles Carroll, signer of the Declaration of Independence.

Examination of the lists will show many who first settled in the lands acquired by the Cherokee cession of 1817, the Creek cession of 1818, and many of the settlers who came in just after the last war with Great Britain. It is very evident that this eastern country saw a large influx of population during the period from 1815 to 1819.

The student of economic development in Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi, and the territory west, will find names of those who came later to the front in the annals of the Nation. The large number of Revolutionary service notations indicate men of families and affairs, and not mere adventurers in the new fields.

This volume will, without doubt, prove of useful service.

FROM THE PUBLISHER OF THE 1976 REPRINT EDITION

This reprint edition of the 1827 Land Lottery contains a new index prepared especially for this Bicentennial Year. Anyone who has used the original book with its index or the later reprints will have noticed that the original index was very inadequate. It contained misspelled names, omission of names (in fact Miss Edith Clark who prepared the new index said she found 3 consecutive pages ommited from the index), names with the wrong page assigned to them, names in the index which were not to be found in the book. Therefore this new index has been prepared in hopes that it will remedy some of the frustration that people using this Lottery have experienced as they sought to locate members of their family.

The reader's attention is also called to the fact that this printed 1827 Lottery found printed herein is not the complete 1827 Land Lottery, as many people do not know this. There is a second part of this Lottery which several knowledgeable genealogists tell me has disappeared completely. Miss Houston did not state in her 1928 edition that there was a second part to this Lottery, but she did in her small pamphlet-booklet "600 Revolutionary Soldiers Living in Georgiz in 1827-8" published in 1932, and I will quote a part of her introduction to that broklet, viz.

"During the drawings the list of those participating was published daily. Subsequently these lists were bound in two volumes. Only a few copies of these volumes are known to be in existence now.

"The first volume has been reprinted under the title, 'Official Register of Land Lottery of 1827 (Reprint).' It contains the names of over thirty thousand persons resident in Georgia at that time, including about three thousand Revolutionary soldiers.

"The second volume has never been reprinted, and so the names of soldiers listed in it are not available except to the few who have an opportunity to consult one of the three copies still in existence. In order to make this information more readily available to all interested, the names of all Revolutionary soldiers and widows and orphans of Revolutionary soldiers have been abstracted from it, and comprise this booklet.

"It is to be hoped that some day the second volume may be reprinted in its entirety, as the two volumes list almost all heads of families in the state, and so serve as a census.

"It may be safely asserted that the reprint of the first volume and this booklet together contain the name of every Revolutionary soldier and widow of Revolutionary soldier resident in Georgia in 1827-8 who had been there three years, and also names of soldiers whose orphans were residents at that time and had been there three years."

It is my hope that sometime and somewhere this second part of the 1827 Land Lottery will come to light so that it can be published and as Miss Houston states above "serve as a cersus" for that mid period of the 1820's.

NOTES and QUESTIONS — The 1640 U.S. cencus of Tailoot County, Ga. shows James Barrow with these siblings. MALES: I under 5 — I age 40/50. The one age 5/10 would be John T. Barrow, but who was the other boy and what became of him? — FEMALES: — I under 5 — 2 age 5/10 — 2 age 10/15 — 1 age 40/50. Who was the 5th girl and what became of her? — (Rev. James Barrow moved to Carroll County, Ga. in 1842 and was instrumental in the establishment of EDEN Baptist Church, near the town of Bowdon. It was the first Baptist Church in the western part of the county). Prior to finding the will of James R. Barrow, dated 10 June 1880, and recorded at Carrollton, Carroll County, Ga., I did not know the names of William H.C. Barrows' brothers and sisters. In his will he names four of his sisters and used their married surnames. He also named his "deceased brother", John T. Barrow, and appointed his other brother, William H. Barrow, as "guardian of my son John William Barrow". — (J.W. "Willie" Barrow was his only living child.) The birth dates of these five he named, and I have enumerated, are from U.S. cencus records and may not be the exact year of their birth, but probably are close. — If their year of birth is correct, then their county of birth is also correct because tax records of Upson and Talbot Counties, Ga. show Rev. James Barrow lived there in those years. The marriage dates are from Carroll County, Ga. marriage records at Carrollton, and are correct.

Of special interest is: -- Two daughters and one son of Rev. James Barrow married two sons and one daughter of Gabrel and Nancy Smith, who lived just north of the town of Bowdon, making their offsprings triple first cousins.

Gideon Smith married Mildred "Millie' Barrow---- Mildred was the oldest child of Rev. James and Lucy although there possibly could have been some older that died early or that were too old to move to Carroll County with their parents. Gideon was the brother of Charles Smith who married Millie's sister Sarah Jane Barrow and of Martha M. Smith who married Millie's brother John Barrow.

The Smiths were a large family of farmers who settled in the Smithfield area of North West Carroll County having drawn land there in the land lottery. Jacob Barrow also drew land in thid district "for the orphans of Moses Barrow". It is probable that John Barrow was living on this land. Smithfield was named for these SMiths. (Bonnie Spruill Barrow was born and raised in the Smithfield area and her father, Marvin Spruill built the rock school house named "Smithfield" and where Bonnie went to school.) It is possible that the Barrows and Smiths were close friends or even relatives for many years befoe moving to Carroll Co. We know that Moses Barrow and Drew Smith owned land adajacent to each other in North Carolina. Two of Moses' children were named Mary Drew and Mildrige Smith which indicates a very close relationship of possibly that Drew Smith was the father of the wife of Moses. Some researchers now suspect that our great-great grand mether was not named Mildred Powell as is on the DAR records but was Martha Smith? Or Moses could have been married twice, the first time to Mildred Powell and then to Martha Smith? A number of the Smiths are buried at popular In the Springs Church not far from the Smithfield School.

Gideon was a Private in Company F of the 19th Georgia Infantry. Enlisted June 11,1861. Discharged disability due to chronic diarrhoea, June 13, 1862.

Charles Smith who married Sarah Jane Barrow, joined the 56th Georgia Infantry on May 5, 1862 and was appointed 4th Sgt. (John barrow was also in Co. B and was the 3rd Sgt. Zach Spruill, Bonnie's great grandfather along with three of his brothers were members of Co.C of this regiment.) Charles had previously been a Private in Co. D, 3rd Regiment Georgia State Troops and was mustered out at Savannah on April 20,1862 (he enlisted Oct. 13,1861). He was captured at Vicksburg on July 4, 1864 and parolled on July 8, 64. Wounded in the right leg at New Hope Church near Dallas, Ga. June 27,64 necessitating amputation above the knee. He was born in Georgia on Feb. 10, 1835 and died in Carroll Co. Nov. 12, 1907.

of Cobb's Legion. He was Colonel of the 41st and was killed at Perryville, Ky.

Lumpkin Plott married Martha A. Francis Barrow (2nd child of Rev. James and Lucy)

I believe that he too was a causality of the Civil War as the 1870 Carroll Co.

cencus shows Martha Francis along with her 14 year old daughter living in the house of Rev. James Barrow.

He is of a retiring spirit, not through pride, or vanity, or want of warm social feelings, but by reason of the high estimate he places on others, and the low estimate he places on himself. He is plain, unaffected and forcible in his style of preaching, and faithful in discharging pastoral duties, especially in visiting the poor and sick of the flock. He takes a uniform interest in the maintenance of prayer-meetings, and never fails to get up and carry on Sunday-schools in his churches, and where communities have had none. Little things he performs because he feels that they are for Christ; and great things he attempts because he trusts that Christ will help him in them.

Rev. James Barrow was instrumental in the founding of the ELEM Missistary Emptist Church near the town of Bowdon. It was the first Church of that denomination in the western part of Carroll County, Ga. -- Rev. James Farrow died at Bowdon, Ga. on 30 July 1884 at the home of his Son, William Henry C. Barrow, and is buried beside his wife Lucinda, "Lucy", Blvins, Barrow at the Bowdon, Ga. Baptist Church Cenetary. (BVC).

James R. Barrow, who was known as "Jimmy", was born on Christmas Day, 1801, three days before the death of his father, Moses Barrow, a Revolutionary War veteran of North Carolina. After the Revolutionary War, veteran Moses drew Washington County, GA land in a land lottery. The family moved to Georgia around 1798 where Jimmy, the last of the children, was born. In only a short time after Moses' death, Jimmy's mother, Martha Smith Barrow, married Mr. Charles Thompson, a friend of the family. The younger children including Jimmy, moved to the Thompson home near High Shoals, GA and the older ones went to live with their uncle, James Barrow, a wealthy land owner who lived near Milledgeville. When he was around 10 years old, his mother passed away and Jimmy and the other Barrow children went to Uncle James' home to live there until older brother, Jacob, became of age and became their legal guardian.

Later, James became severely handicapped by what was know back then as "rheumatism" and was unable to farm. He purchased a two acre lot from Mr. Seborn Smith for \$5.00 per acre. This lot was located a short distance west of the crossroads which would become the center of Bowdon. He built a cabin where the Barrow House is located today on West College Street which was about half way between the cross roads and where the college would be located. By this time, he and "Lucy" had two more sons, the youngest being my great grandfather, James R. Barrow JR.

To make ends meet, James had taken up the profession of "Spreading the Gospel" years before being ordained by the Carrollton Baptist Church in 1850. For instance, in Dr. James Bonner's history of Carroll County, *Georgia's Last Frontier*, he states that James R. Barrow in 1847 was the first pastor of the Upper Tallapoosa Missionary Baptist Church located just to the north of Carrollton. While he was the pastor there, the church was relocated to Carrollton where it became The Baptist Church of Christ of Carrollton or the today's First Baptist Church of Carrollton. He also preached where he and Lucy were members at the Eden Baptist Church which was located south of Bowdon near the Little Tallapoosa River on the Bowdon-Tyus Road. He was among the members of the Eden Church who were granted permission to leave that church and form the Bowdon

Baptist Church in 1860. We know that he preached at the Bowdon Missionary Baptist Church after its formation but never as the pastor (?).

As mentioned in a *Christian Index* article, he was a missionary for the new lands in Western Georgia and Eastern Alabama. As a Circuit Riding Spreader of the Gospel, he helped establish numerous churches in the newly opened lands in Alabama. He later preached wherever there was an opportunity. There are saved newspaper articles of his preaching as far away from Bowdon as Tuskegee, AL and many different locations in between. His hands and legs were so drawn that he had to have assistance in getting onto his horse.

He lived to be over 83 years old. His cousin, Dr. David Barrow, Chancellor of the Georgia University System, said of him in a letter," The old preacher is badly crippled and has trouble making his rounds but never misses a calling." He goes on to say, "He can quote entire chapters of the Bible from memory." He is buried in the Bowdon Baptist Church cemetery alongside "Lucy" who had met a terrible death when fatally burned while working around a wash pot.

An interesting story passed down over the generations on The Reverend Barrow is in regards to his circuit riding on or about April 27, 1865 during the Civil War. Federal General Croxton and about 1,500 Yankee cavalrymen were raiding and burning through Alabama and Western Georgia. General Lee had surrendered at Appomattox Court House on April 9 and the war for all practical purposes was over but the Yankees wanted to destroy as much of the South that they possibly could before the war officially ended. The old parson was making his rounds riding on a fine horse in Trickum Valley, Alabama where he met a squad of the raiders. One of the soldiers noticed the preacher's fine saddle and it being in much better shape than the one he had, ordered the old man off his horse and exchanged his worn out saddle for the good one. This made the old preacher mad and he shouted, "You boys will go to hell for what you have done today!" The young Yankee soldier who had taken the saddle then said, "If I am going to hell, I will need a better horse to ride." He then took the Reverend's good horse leaving him with a worn out one along with the sorry saddle. This story was passed down through the generations as a lesson that it is sometimes better just to keep your mouth shut.

A STORY ON REVEREND JAMES BARROW

The Reverend James of Bowdon, Georgia was born 25 December 1801 in Washington County, Georgia, the son of Moses Barrow and Martha Smith of North Carolina. Moses, a Revolutionary War Soldier, was the son of Thomas Barrow. JR and Elizabeth Atkinson of Virginia and North Carolina. We believe that Martha was the grand daughter of the well-known Drew Smith of North Carolina.

His hands were badly drawn and he was forced to walk with the aid of crutches and had to be helped onto his horse and evidently a lot in Bowdon. In his middle life he became very crippled by what at time was called rheumatism. We have newspaper articles of his preaching as far away as Tuskeege, AL which is probably 150 miles James, or "Vinniny" or "Uncle Jiminy" as he was called in his later days became a mechanic by trade and lived in Talbot and Upson countries before moving to Carroll County in the 1830s. Her sufferings were agonizing, and her last moments were in a state of insensibility. For many years she shared in the labors and toils of a minister of Christ. She rests from her labors, leaving the aged servant to toil on in hope of eternal glory. May the Good Shepherd lead him safely and peacefully through life to glory.

[Lucy's clothing caught fire while she was working around a wash pot. Some passing by Indians found her and extinguished the flames but too late. Her marker in the Bowdon Baptist Church Cemetery gives her date of death as Feb. 1874. This is surely incorrect as this obituary was published in Jan. 1874.]
