

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## JAMES REEVES BARROW

Born: 3 Oct., 1844----Died: 11 June, 1880

James R. Barrow was the youngest of the seven children, that we know of, of the Rev. James and Lucindia "Lucy" Bivens Barrow. He was born in Bowdon, Carroll County, Ga. and attended the old Bowdon Academy which was a school that taught military as well as the usual subject to the boys.. The Governor of Ga. had supplied the school with old flint firing muskets and swords so the boys were well drilled when the Civil War started and were all ready to answer the call. They had trouble finding a Brigade that was accepting troops and which suited their requirments however and it was not until July, 1861 that they marched the 30 odd miles to Newnan, Ga., boarded the train to Big Shanty and there joined Tom R.R. Cobb becoming Company B of the famed Cobb's Georgia Legion. Cobb was a well known lawyer and a brother of Howell Cobb. Tom wrote the Confederate Constitution which he based on the U.S. document. The Legion was composed of 7 companies of infantry, 10 companies of calvary, and the Troup Artillery of Athens, Ga.. The three segments were separated after reaching the war zone as the Legion concept proved to be unmanageable in a "modern war". The infantry never exceeded the 7 companies however and never reached regimental strength of 10 companies.

The Legion reached Richmond in August and went into camp at Camp Cobb at the fair grounds along with the Ga. commanded by brother Howell. Their camp was reported to be the most military and sanitary of the many that crowded the Richmond area because these men represented the South's best being well educated and comanded by competent officers. In the fall they took a boat trip down the James to the Yorktown area and fortified a defensive line at Dam No. 1 on the Warwick river. They took part in the first action on the peninsula at Big Bethel. Later on the retreat toward Richmond , they fought at Williansburg and in the Seven Days Battles including Malvern Hill where the Legion suffered fairly heavy losses. They were left to guard the approaches to Richmond while Gen Lee with Stonewall Jackson defeated Pope at 2nd Bull Run. They then joined the army for the march into Maryland that resulted in the bloody battle of Antietam. On Sept. 14, 1862 at Crampton's Gap, Md. the Legion was engaged in deadly combat with the Federal Army's 6th Corps and suffered over 60% casulties from which they never recovered.

Private James R. was shot through the left ankle, captured, and later that night his leg was amputated by Yankee surgeons. This was performed in the little Congregationalist Church Annex (rebels were put out back while Yankee wounded were treated in the church) which still stands today and has been visited several times by the writer. He recovered nicely thanks to excellent care by the local ladies and good northern doctors. He was transfered to Baltimore then to Fortress Monroe, Va. and exchanged on Dec. 4, 1862. Thus his military career ended at the age of 18 years and 2 months.

James R. returned to Bowdon and opened a mercantile store which in 1865 was sacked by Wilson's raiders as they plundered the desolate countryside. He nevertheless prospered and became a well-to-do merchant and also a half owner of Victory Mills which was a complex of a cotton gin, saw mill, tannery, and grist mill.

He died of TB which we are told he contacted while a Federal prisoner.

He was the greatgrandfather of Virginia Ellen Barrow Barr and David Trammell Barrow of Bowdon and Hugh W. Barrow of Dalton, Ga. The Confederate marker was placed at his gravesite in the Bowdon Baptist Church Cemetery in Oct, 1993 by his great grand children.

Cobb's Legion continued in the Army of Northern Virginia taking part in every major battle up until the end. They also accompied Lomgstreet to Ga. in the fall of 1863 leading the attack on Fort Sanders at Knoxville and suffering more casulties than any other unit. Only 3 members were present to surrender with Lee at Appomattox. It was one of the best known units of the Confederate Army and the only unit, North or South, metioned in "Gone With the Wind" as Ashley Wilkes was a Captain in Cobb' Legion.

William Barrow, James R's brother and the great grandfather of Martin Chambers, a Charter Member of The Barrow Association of America, was also a member of Company B-Cobb's Legion. He was wounded several times and captured at Gaines Mill after the battle of Cold Harbor. He was exchanged near Savannah and then was captured again at Bowdon in April, 1865 by the Wilson raiding party. He was paroled at Macon, Ga. after the close of the war. At the death of James R. he became the guardian of John William and raised him in his household.

As of May 1986, little is known about JOHN T. BARROW. His place of birth or his exact age is not known, but he is believed to be the oldest son of Rev. James Barrow. the 2nd of the three Barrow brothers to volinteer for service in the CSA. (HMC)

In the will of James R. Barrow, dated 10 June 1880, Carroll County, Ga., item 8, he says"I give bequeth & devise to my beloved brother John T. Barrow, deceased, daughter Elvira S. Phillips and his son James R. Barrow \$100.00 each". From this we know that John T. was the brother of James R. and William Henry C. Barrow of Bowdon Carroll Co.Ga.

The Civil War record shows that John T. Barrow enlisted in the CSA at Carrollton, Carroll County, Ga. on 5 May 1862 and was assigned to Co. B, 56th Infantry Regiment. He was paid \$50.00 "bounty pay" 13 June 1862. (bounty pay is now called, enlistment bonus). On 31 Oct. 1862 he is listed on the Co. B. Muster Roll as a Sgt. and was paid \$100.30. Nothing else is shown on his Civil War records, but on 29 July 1863, his "widow", Martha M., ? , Barrow applied for "Claims of settlement for what was due him, bounty or other allowances for his service's". (The C/W record does not show what, if anything, she was 5= 1832 Upson Graty for died between 3 nd+13th Feb. 1863-Atlanta

On 14 April 1891 she applied for a Civil War "Widow's" Pension and on the application gave this information, she said:

- 1. "She is the widow of John T. Barrow, with two children". (no names are given)
- 2. "We were married 13 July 1854 and have lived in the state of Georgia continuously since that time", (where they were married is not stated)
- 3. "While the Army was at Chattanooga, Tenn. he was sent to the hospital at Ringold, Ga. (no date or reason was given) and from there he was sent to the Small hospital in Atlanta, Ga. (no'date or reason given) where he contracted small pox and died of the disease beteen the 3rd and the 13th day of Feb. 1863 at said hospital". (where he was burried is not stated).
- 4. She signed the application with an X.
- 5. She was awarded a \$100.00 per year pension on that same date, 14 April 1891 and continued to draw it through 1907 from Carroll County, Ga.
