
According to newspaper reports, the driver of the car was attempting to beat the train over the crossing and only reached the track, when the car was hit and demolished.

#### JOHN WILLIAM BARROW

John William Barrow first became a merchant in Bowdon at the age of 21.

"J. W." Barrow built 7 of the brick store buildings in the town of Bowdon.

His first store building was in partnership with S. B. Little and was next door to the bank building which stood on the north west corner of the intersection. In 2004 it would be where a part of the building occupied by the current bank now stands. Years ago I believe it was the Copeland store (with the great pop corn and parched peanuts).

He then traded his ½ share of the Victory Mills property to George McDaniel for a wooden store located where the Allen's 5 & 10 Cents store used to be.

His first brick store building was built where the J. B. Moore store used to be. It was the second brick store building in town as John Shelnutt built the first one where Witt's Electric shop is

His second brick store building was where the Rexall Drug Store was. The bank having moved to the corner where Bean's (Dobson's) Drug Store was.

His third brick store building was the building which was where the Pearl Holmes Grocery store was.

His fourth brick store building was where the Mary Holland store was.

The fifth brick store building he built was on the north side of the street and which was occupied by Warren's Barber Shop. (probably now part of the corner bank?)

The sixth brick store building was the Barrow Hardware two-story (also with a basement) and the only building in Bowdon which had an elevator.

He also built over 25 dwelling houses for sale or rent in Bowdon. He was a major stock holder in the Bowdon Oil Mill, the pickle factory, Bank of Bowdon and the Bowdon Railway. He served on the Board of Trustees of Bowdon College, was Chairman of the Carroll County Board of Education for a number of years, gave scholarships to Bowdon College and was a Deacon of the Bowdon Baptist Church for many years.

Unfortunately he lost his entire fortune during the depression years. He never lost faith in the people of Bowdon and always was Bowdon's biggest booster. MY DADDY was born in BOWDON GEORGIA, in a stone's throw of where he now lives, ina straight up-and-down plank cabin in the year 1866, September 5th. It was during the reconstruction days, after the war between the states.

His father, James R. Barrow, fought with the SOUTNERN ARMY, COBBS LEGION Company B: losing his leg in the battle of South Mountain in Virginia, but was returned home to live for thirteen years, when he died oftuberculosis, a disease which he contracted from exposure on the battlefield. Precedeing him were his wife, Martha Holmes Barrow and a daughter, Georgia, who died whenage eight, leavin an only child, JOHN WILLIAM BARROW (MY Father).

This young man, a lonely little boy, went to live with his uncle William Barrow, his guardian, where he resided until he entered Mercer University at Macon Georgia, where he belonged to the Kappa Alpha Fraternity and the Phi Delta Society.

His first position was at Waco Georgia for Jeter Brothers where he worked only a few months. At Christmas I887 he returned to BOWDON where he married MISS MARTHA ELLEN LOVVORN, and set up housekeeping on a tract of land whichhad been purchased from the Indians by Seaborne Smith, who in turn sold it to G.R. Brown from whom it was purchased by James Barrow, whose Father was the Reverend JAMES BARROW, a BAPTIST Minister and an evangalist during the war, traveling on horse-back throughout the barren Country. His wife a Miss Bevins, was burned to death from an open fire while parching Coffee for her family.

J.W.Barrow with his partner, Joe Little. opened up a general Merchandise business within two weeks after he was married and centinued for six years, when the partnership was disolved and "J.W.Barrow General Merchandise" was established, from which grew one of the largest in Carroll County or Western Georg: Laterhe sold all the various branches and specialized in Hardware, operating the BARROW HARDWARE Company for almost fifty tears. All told, he was one of the most PROGRESSIVE influential merchants of Bowdon. 

He joined the Bowdon Baptist Church in early life and grew up to be a leader in his church, having served as choir director for twenty years, often using members of his choir for special music at funerals and civic programs. He frequently left his business to respond to requests to direct the music on special occasions in various sections of West Georgia, and other places. Otis received his education in the public schools of Bowdon and Bowdon College, later attending the Bagwell Business College of

Atlanta. Completing his education, he returned to Bowdon to become associated with his father in the hardware business, and was bookkeeper for the Barrow Hardware Company for many





W. D. Lovvorn, farmer and miller, Bowdon, Carroll County, Georgia, son of James and Bashaba (Traylor) Lovvorn, was born in Henry County, Georgia, in 1831. His greatgrandfather, Elijah Lovvorn, came from Ireland to this country before the Revolutionary War, and was a soldier in the patriot army, during which time he fought barefooted and on frozen ground. His grandparents, James and Hannah (Smith) Lovvorn, were born in Virginia, whence they moved to North Carolina, and afterwards to Georgia, about 1800 and settled in what is now Morgan County and from there they moved to St. Clair County, Alabama. He was a soldier in the War of 1812, William Lovvorn was born in Morgan County, Georgia, but went with his father to Alabama where his father lived the rest of his life. He was reared on the farm in Alabama and was educated in the common country schools (walking three miles, sometimes barefooted in the winter). The school that he attended was made of logs, had a dirt floor, with split log-puncheon seats. After "graduating," he taught school for a few years. He was justice of the peace for many years and in 1872 he was elected to represent Randolph County in the legislature of Alabama. He was the last Republican elected from that county. In 1878, he moved to Bowdon, Georgia, where he bought a large farm. He built and ran the "famous" Lovvorn mill, which is still in operation. He came to Bowdon primarily to educate his eleven children and eleven children of his were educated in Bowdon College.

He was more than liberal with his money where Bowdon and Bowdon College were concerned. When the people of Bowdon decided to build the new college building in 1900, it was William Lovvorn who gave the clay for the brick, \$5,000 in money, all the doors and windows, and the shingles for the roof. Mrs. W. D. Lovvorn gave all the opera seats, the office equipment and furnished every room in the college with new desks. During the quarter of a century he lived in Bowdon, he gave over \$100,000 for the college and the town. He was a trustee of Bowdon College from 1878 until his death.

In 1851 he borrowed fifty cents to buy his marriage license and married Miss Sara D. Burden. Eleven children were born to this union. No family has made a greater contribution to Bowdon College, Bowdon, and Carroll County than has the W. D. Lovvorn family. He was a Baptist and an arden supporter of his church. He died on December 17, 1900, and is buried beside his wife in the Bowdon Cemetery.<sup>39</sup>

His philosophy of success in life was to work hard twelve hours a day, six days a week, and fifty-two weeks during the year. 40

## BIOGRAPHY OF COL. W. D. LOVVORN

This week Mrs. Harvey Jackson had a copy of a Bowdon Intelligence, dated December 13, 1900, tabloid form. It had ads on the front page, one of them being Perryman, Jackson and Grif-

Prices were unbelievable in the advertisements throughout, as "Children's Shoes — 5 cents each and up, Men's Shirts, 10 cents each and up, Men's Suits reduced from \$2.50 to \$1.75 and from \$6.00 to \$4.00.

Several of the classifieds on, the front were from J. W. Barrow. One of them read, "Come, price our Christmas goods before you buy and we will sell you sure." J. W. Barrow.

And of the newspaper: "It is nearly Christmas, so as soon as you can, please bring us the wood pine you promised on your sub-

scription." J. W. Yarbrough was editor then

Quite a change from then to now. Our subscribers have been coming up this week, too, but with real money. — some a couple years or more.

But getting back to 1900. This particular issue belongs to Iverson Lovvorn of Newell, and from it we reprint the biography of Mr Lovvorn.

### EXPLANATION

Reasons for this brief biographical sketch: Col. Lovvorn has been president of the Board of Trustees of Bowdon College for twenty-three years; he has done more for Bowdon College than any other man;

he redeemed the College when it was under a mortgage; from the first to the last, he spent over four-teen hundred dollars on the old college, he gave five hundred dollars on the new college building; he is the best friend the college ever had.

Col. Lovvorn's parents were James Lovvorn and Bath...ebma Lovvorn. They were of Scotch Irish decent.

Col. Lovvorn was born in Henry County, Ga., February 7, 1831; moved to Randolph County, Ala in 1838; lived there till 1877, when he moved to Bowdon, Ga., where he now lives.

Col. Lovvorn, comparatively speaking, had no opportunities whatsoever. He received only three months schooling—in a log house—no floor, no desks, no windows, and split logs for seats. He went to school barefooted, wore homespun pants, a white cotton shirt, and a wool hat.

Hence, as will be seen, his advantages were very limited.

In 1852, he was married to Sarah

Delila Burden.

### PUBLIC LIFE

Col. Lovvorn's public life extends through thirty-five years. He has been a leader of men for more than a a third of a century.

He represented Randolph County, Ala in the Legislature for two terms. He moved to Bowdon, Ga. in the fall of 1877. He was elected president of the Board of Trustees of Bowdon College a short while after moving, which position he has since filled.

He was, for, many years a director of the Carrollton Bank and a charter member of the Oil Mill and Cotton Factory of Carrollton, Ga.

He served as Commissioner of Roads and Revenue for eight years. While Col. Lovvorn has served his country in various ways, his great work has been to his Community—near his own home. He has been the central figure of Bowdon and community for nearly a quarter of a century.

He has actively and financially supported every worthy cause and enterprise in Bowdon. He has helped to build every church in Bowdon, and many others in different parts of the county. He has responded liberally to the upbuilding of the schools. Education has no stronger.

THEY WERE ALSO THE LEADING PEOPL OF THEIR COMMUNITIES. TOM NATSON BECAME THEIR LEADER.

IN 1893 W. D. LOVVORN SOLD FIGHT BALES OF COTTON TO PAY HIS TAXES BUT WAS STILL \$50 SHORT.

IN1895 THE POPULIST MERGED WITH THE REPUBLICAN PARTY. THE LOVVORNS OF BOWDON HAVE BEEN REPUBLICANS OVER THE YEARS AND AT TIMES THIS CAUSED RESENTMENT IN THE COMMUNITY.
