

#### SOMETHING TO REMEMBER

On a beautiful afternoon way back in February 1920 a big hunk of something with a motor attached began circling over a cotton field just south of Bowdon between the Lovvorn house, now Maxwell, and the present site of M & W Trucking Co on Tyus Road landed in that cotton field which turned out to be an airplane.

The writer and his brother, Willard, were walking home from town on Wedowee St. We were about half-way between what is now known as the Fuller and Daniel houses. The two of us, realizing the air-plane (spelled aeroplane back then) was going to land in that cotton field. At twelve years of age the writer out ran the brother of nine. Being the first person to reach the plane with its propellar still turning the pilot raised his voice and yelled some words never heard before: "GET YOUR BEFORE YOU GET KILLED".

Back then twelve year old boys were not afraid of anything. Stories of airplanes had been printed and even pictures were available of those things called airplanes so why sould a boy be afraid of one landing in a cotton field.

The double-winged plane was equipped with wirespoked wheels and pneumatic tires about the same
as present-day light-weight motorcycles use. The
wing-span was about twenty-five feet. The length from the propellar to the tail was about
thirty feet. The fabric used to cover the wings
was something like silk cloth that had been waterproofed. From the cock-pit to the tail section
was very decorative being painted in black and
white checker-board design.

Very soon after the plane had landed the area was covered with people gazing at and wandering

"No funeral gloom, my dears, when I am gone.

Corpse-ga zings, tears, black raiment, graveyard grimness. Think of me as withdrawn into

the dimness,

These beautiful words of Ellen Terry are so fitting as one thinks of the life and going of Hugh W Barrow, in whose passing the entire town and community, as well as a host of loved ones, suffered a distinct loss. Hugh, were he here to speak for himself would plead the sentiment of this beloved poet.
He would want no gloom, grimness, tears or black raiment—he just wasn't like that. In spite of any discouraging, disappointing circumstances, as his pastor said, "he could take it." He did not burden those about him with any personal adverses or worries. In all of life's experiences it can be said of Hugh Barrow. He was a "lifter." Others could lean upon him, could count on him-he was happiest when he was sharing his strength and never failing support with those who were less fortu-tinate. Even as the grim reaper was hovering over his home, even touching it, he was gathering up shoes, clothing and various articles for a needy family-doing the thing he was happiest doing.

Most of us feel we are working to extend His kingdom. We are keep quite busy with program, this and that allotted by the Church and its organizations. Hugh was not always in the front pew . . . he made no loud profession or or pretense in questions of spiritual life and living . . , yet dare any of us say we have ministered

unto the teast of these more of anything like as much, as this always cheerful, jovial apostle of good works? He was happiest when he could go out in the highways and byways and serve humanity-and it made no difference with Hugh of the color, race or creed.

Ella Wheeler Wilcox in her pertinent, pointed poem, "Lifting and Leaning," declares only one "lifter" to twenty who learn. Some-how he knew every needy person and family throughout the town, and far out into other sections of Carroll County.

There could hardly be a better example of "practicing Christianity" than this one whom we are proud to call neighbor-and with this application, his golden heart, his ever kindly, thoughtful lifehis intense concern for the welfare of those about him, means all the word implies. Truly, he was the good Samaritan. As his neighbor for more than a quarter of a century, the writer is well able to know.

Seven times, since we have been neighbors, tragedy and death have visited us. Ac often as such experiences have come, the arm of sympathy was placed about us and with the love of a son the plea for the privilege to share our sor-

row has come.

Feeling his inexpressable loss, honored in his own country. one was touched to the depth as the fond old father cried, "what can I do without my Hugh boy?" "what Scriptures do not mislead or declare in error when He said, "him that would be greatest among you, first let him be servant of all, has rung true throughout the ages. Our greatest people are those who truly love to serve humanity. Further verifying the truth of the statement was the hundreds of grief-stricken, loving friends who came in streams to the home to view the remains of one who had so often served them and had never turned a headless ear.

Many of those who came were the colored people he had so often accomodated—among them two colored men, one from Rockmart, the other nearer by, who had worked for him, driving trucks, loading and unloading for him, who had never forgotten "Mr. Hugh's kindness to them." Attention was called to the fact that many of these friends of a race he had taught a better, kinder way of life, paid their bus fares from a distance just to look for the last time on the remains of one who had been a true friend to them.

Then there were the employees so thought of the many, untiring foot-steps he had made around his mother, the late Mrs. Ellen press.

beloved person.

Virginia 71, passed away at Jubal Watts Memorial Hospital Thursday, August 21, 1969. She was born at Five Points, Chambers County, Alabama, May 4, 1898, the daughter of the late Appling Thomas and Leila Johnson Trammell, prominent citizens and progressive leaders in their community and native state. She was married to the late Hugh Will Barrow October 28, 1917, who proceded her in death November 10, 1950. She had lived in Bowdon 60 years.

Virginia, loved by all who knew her, lived a rich, full life. She ate not "the bread of idleness." She actively supported every worthwhile undertaking promoted for the welfare and betterment of all mankind. She was a valued employee of Sewell Manufacturing Company, where her agreeable, congenial personality won friends and made her a favorite with all with whom she was associated.

Having mothered and cared for her own children while they were growing up, following her husband's death she accepted the position of house mother at the churches' Home for Business Girls in Atlanta here she continued to mother



2.


