A great-great-great soldier

Honoring a Revolutionary War soldier

After being unmarked for years, great-great-great grandson, Hugh Barrow, and family placed a Veteran's Administration marble marker in honor of Barrow's great-great-great grandfather, Thomas Trammell, a Revolutionary War soldier.

"For many years I have tried to locate the burial sites of a number of my ancestors, including that of Thomas Trammell. Growing up, I did not hear about my great-great-great grandfather. I did know that he was a Revolutionary War soldier and did find out in what units he served. I only discovered where he was buried last year. I had some information that he died in Pike County, but did not know that it would now be Upson," Barrow said.

Trammell was born in 1747 in one of the Carolinas. When he was 33-years-old he lived in South Carolina, and he enlisted as a private in Captain Hughes' Company of Colonel Thomas Brandon's calvary unit of "Carolina Horsemen."

"His great grandfather, another Thomas, came to America in 1670 and settled in Stafford County, Va. His grandfather and father also lived in Stafford County. His father moved to North Carolina and then to the Ninety Six District, South Carolina (east of Spartanburg), before the Revolution," Barrow said. "We do not know if Thomas, the Revolutionary War soldier, was born in Virginia, North Carolina or South Carolina, but we do have records that he was born in 1747. He married Mary Turner in South Carolina before the war. He died at his home in Pike Co. in 1823. He was evidently a fairly prosperous farmer at this time, and I wonder why his grave was not marked."

Trammell is buried in the Antioch United Methodist Church Cemetery which is located in Upson Co.

"His wife Mary and his sons drew land in Alabama that was ceded to the United States by the Creek Indian treaty of 1832 and moved to this

THOMAS TRAMMELL

For many years, I have tried to locate the burial sites of a number of my ancestors including those of my two great-great-grandfathers, Revolutionary War soldiers Moses Barrow and Thomas Trammell. As far as I know, none of the family historians knew exactly the location of their graves. We believe that Moses Barrow was buried in Washington County, GA on his plantation along Keg Creek near Deep Step and that Thomas Trammell was buried in the section of Upson County, GA that in early times was a part of Pike County. We will continue our efforts to find Moses' grave site. Recently, we have discovered valuable information that Thomas Trammell was buried in the Antioch Methodist Church Cemetery in what is now Upson County, GA.

A new publication placed in Carrollton's Neva Lomason Library Special Collection Section by the Carrollton Chapter of The Sons of the American Revolution list by Georgia counties the Revolutionary War soldiers who made Georgia their permanent home and died there. A copy of the title page of this book is attached which gives all the authors and credits due.

The book lists Moses Barrow as living in Washington County but does not give any information on his burial site. To our amazement, it lists the burial site of Thomas Trammell as being in the Antioch Methodist Church Cemetery near Thomaston on Highway 19 north of the city. It lists this in Walker County, GA but we know that it is in Upson, formerly Pike, County. Copies of these listings are included with this paper.

I visited the Church several times and talked with Reverend Barnes the pastor and two of the Trustees of the Church. One of the Trustees turned out to be an old friend of mine, who was the Superintendent of Continuous Dyeing at Thomaston Mills, Mr. Eldo "Pee Wee" Ellerby. They were most cooperative and wanted to help me in any way they could. There are no church records that go back anywhere near 1823 the year that Thomas Trammell died. They assisted me in selecting a "used lot" in the old section of the Church cemetery. The lot most likely has been used previously but there are no signs of previous burials there today. They agreed for me to place a memorial marker to Thomas Trammell on the selected lot. (This is now a Trammell lot and if any Trammell ever desires to use it they are welcomed and have my permission.)

I then made an application to the Veteran's Administration for a Revolutionary War grave marker for veteran Thomas Trammell. It is a difficult procedure to obtain a Revolutionary War marker and all the information I had on Thomas's service and his wife, Mary Turner Trammell pension application, had to be verified. The application was approved and we were awarded a beautiful white marble marker. The Christian marker is engraved with his name, unit he served with and his birth and death dates.

The Church people and I agreed that because we did not know the exact location of the grave site that we should add to the marker, "IN MEMORY OF". These words were added to the top face side of the monument and on the back side I had added, "ALSO SERVED IN BRANDON'S REG." and several of the battles in which he fought including, "KINGS MT., COWPENS, MUDLICK BRIDGE AND NINETY SIX.

On April 7, 2007, my wife Bonnie, our son Lew, our daughter Ann Barrow Harris and our grandson James "Jamie" Barrow and I placed the marker in the old section of the Antioch United Methodist Church Cemetery. The cemetery is located on U. S. Highway 19 just north of the Thomaston, GA city limits. A number of pictures of the group placing the marker and of the marker are included in this write-up. I wanted the family to do the work and be proud of themselves placing the marker to their ancestor instead of having a professional company do it.

Sometimes this fall, The Sons of the American Revolution plan to dedicated the monument. It will be a big program with members in Revolutionary War uniforms and color guard and firing squad. When I know more about the exact date I will let you know and I hope that many of Thomas Trammell's family will attend and honor him the way he deserves to be.

I believe that now all of my Trammell ancestor's graves are well marked. In November, 1999, my family placed markers on the graves sites of my great, great grandfather and grandmother, Farr Harris Trammell and Sarah Haygood Trammell in the Fredonia Methodist Church Cemetery in Chambers County, AL near Five Points. Before these markers were placed the graves were marked by native flat stones. Pictures of the grave before and after placing the markers are included. My son Lew and grandsons "Jamie" and "Billy" and I placed the marker and Bonnie helped too and took the pictures.

Thomas Trammell's wife Mary Turner is buried in the Trammell lot at Emory Chapel Methodist Church Cemetery in Chambers County, AL near Lafayette. The abandoned Church burned several years ago and the cemetery had been vandalized. We had the Trammell markers repaired but unfortunately the cemetery is neglected. Farr Harris was the son of Thomas and Mary. My great grandparents, Appling Daniel Trammell, MD and Margaret Elizabeth Stillwell Trammell are also buried in their well marked lot in the Fredonia Methodist Church Cemetery. The parents of my mother, Virginia Mae Trammell Barrow, are buried in a nice well marked lot in the Five Points, AL Cemetery. Virginia and husband Hugh Witt Barrow are buried in the Bowdon City Cemetery in Bowdon, GA.

Finding the burial site and honoring my ancestor, Revolutionary War soldier Thomas Trammell with a memorial marker is a great honor to me and one of which I am very proud. I hope that we can let as many as possible of the great number of descendents of Thomas Trammell know of this discovery.

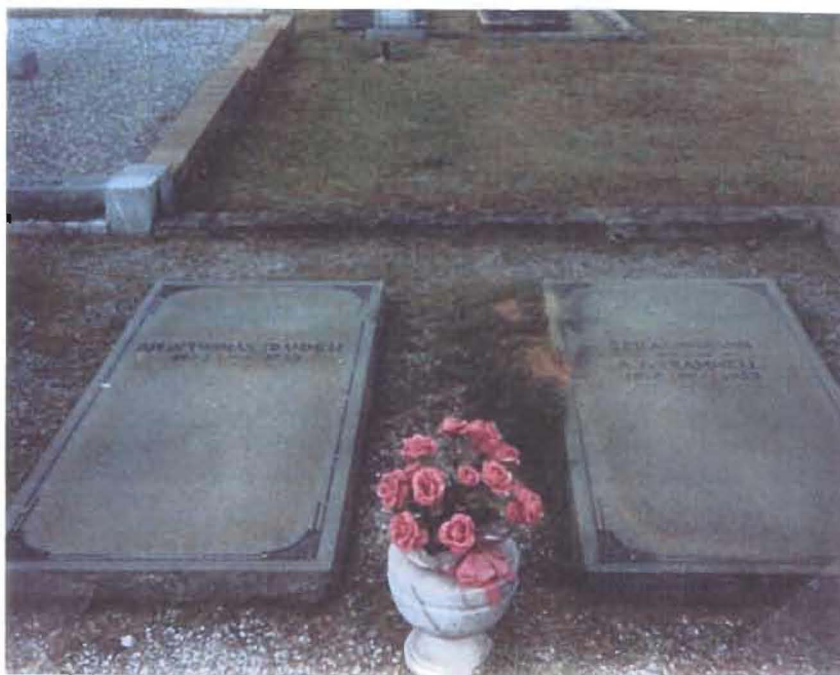

In the spring of 1780, he enlisted in the Union District, South Carolina, as a private in Captain Hughes' Company of Colonel Roebuck's Regiment of the South Carolina Line. He served throughout the war and later lived in Hancock, Jackson (later Clarke), and Upson Counties, Georgia. He died in Upson County and his widow received a pension for his services.
Buried: Antioch Methodist Church, near Thomaston, off Highway 19.

He commanded a brigade at the Battle of Cowpens and served in the North Carolina Troops.
Buried: Old Harmony Church Cemetery, Hootenville. "From Thomaston courthouse square take Highway 19 south 10 7/10 miles, on right side of road is church and cemetery."

WALKER COUNTY

1. Alexander Dunn b. 12/18/1762 d. 12/22/1846
In April of 1779, he was drafted in Rutherford County, North Carolina, and served as a private in Captain William Porter's Company of the North Carolina Troops. On November 15, 1779, he volunteered and served under Captain Robert Gilkey and was sent to Charlotte Town in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina. He was then drafted and put aboard the thirty-six gun ship, *Bricole*, under Captain Peacock and Commodore Davis. He fought at the Battle of Fort Sullivan and was discharged in April of 1780. In May of that year, he volunteered and served in Captain Adam Hampton's Company of the North Carolina Troops commanded by Colonels Robert Porter and Charles McDowell. He was stationed at Colonel Baylis Earle's fort when Forquin's troops from Prince's Fort attacked and killed his brother, Lieutenant Andrew Dunn. At the Battle of King's Mountain, he fought under Colonel Cleveland. After the battle, his unit went to Gilberttown to guard against Tory and Indian movements and remained there until May 1, 1782. Later, his unit captured a blockhouse at the head of the Pacolet

Thomas Trammell was born in 1747 in North or South, Carolina. He was living in Union, South Carolina in 1780 when he enlisted as a private in Captain Hughes' Company of Colonel Roebuck's Regiment of the South Carolina Line. He also served in Colonel Thomas Brandon's cavalry unit of "Carolina Horsemen". Among the battles he fought in were Cow Pens and King's Mountain.

After the Revolutionary War he drew land in Georgia and moved first to Hancock County, then to Clarke and lastly to Pike (the part of Pike County where he farmed later became Upson County).

He died in Pike (now Upson) in 1823 and is buried in an unmarked grave in the Antioch United Methodist Church Cemetery north of Thomaston, GA.

His widow drew land in the 1834 Alabama Land Lottery as a widow of a Revolutionary War soldier and moved to the land in Chambers County, AL. She is buried in the Emory Chapel Methodist Church Cemetery near Lafayette, AL. She drew a pension for Thomas Trammell's Revolutionary War service in both Georgia and Alabama. .

icate of Ga. showing the services rendered by her husband
in the Militia of that State during the Revolutionary War,
The marriage, Service & identity are clearly established
and no grounds that I can perceive even on any one point, for
a doubt as to the justice of her Claim under act of July
1836.

aforesaid - Be it Known that on this the 21st Twenty first day of March A.D. one thousand and eight hundred and forty six, 1846, Personally appeared before me William Turner a resident of said county and state aforesaid. Aged Seventy eight years past - who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the following statements - That he the said Turner Removed with his father from the State of North Carolina to the state of South Carolina Union Distr in the year seventeen hundred and seventy three and afterwards became acquainted with one Thomas Trammell who resided in said Distr about two miles off and in December Seventeen hundred and Seventy five This deponent the said Turner was present at the said Trammells wedding dinner - Was not present when the Marriage Ceremony was administered it being the custom in those days for persons wishing to get married for them to go before some person Authorized to Solemnize the Marriage Ceremony and return after the ceremony being Administered in the Holy bonds of wedlock. This deponent being present when the said Trammell and wife returned it was ascertained that they were legally married by one Esqr Cosby living a few miles off they having went there for that purpose - and this deponent knows of his own Knowledge that the said Trammell and his Wife Mary lived together as man and wife from the day of their weding Dinner until the said Thomas Trammell Deceased in Upson County State

of Georgia - that the said Thomas resided in Union District South Carolina untill the fall of the year Seventeen hundred and Eighty four 1784, and in the latter part of the Spring Seventeen hundred and Eighty 1780 the said Trammell left his home and Family and joined the American Army under the command and in the company of one Captain Hughes in Col. Brandons Ridgement as this deponent always understood and continued to Serve in Said War untill the close of the same as a private principle under the command of the officers aforesaid - as deponent understood Served in what was then called the Mounted Rifled horse company or Rangers in the said Brandons Ridgement - does not Recollect of any other officers that the said Trammell served under but that this deponent understood that the said Trammell a part of his time served on foot - this deponent not being in the service cannot give a narrative of the said Trammells Services but this deponent knows of his own Knowledge that the said Trammell was absent from home from the time specified in the foregoing untill the close of the war only coming home and staying a few days at a time with his family on furlough or permit from his Respective officers - this Deponent visiting the said Trammell frequently when he was at home - Knew him to be punctual in leaving home to return to the army only staying out the time allotted him in his furlough - but as to his service it is only hearsay from himself and others, and this deponent further declares that the said Trammell removed from Union Distr South Carolina to the state of Georgia now Hancock County, in the fall of the year 1784 Seventeen hundred and Eighty four - and this deponent Removed the preceding from Union Distr. South Carolina to the state of Georgia now Hancock County and settled within one mile or less of the said Trammell and lived neighbor to him about thirteen years and the said Trammell Removed from thence to Clarke County now and from thence to Upson County State of Georgia where the said Trammell Died in the year

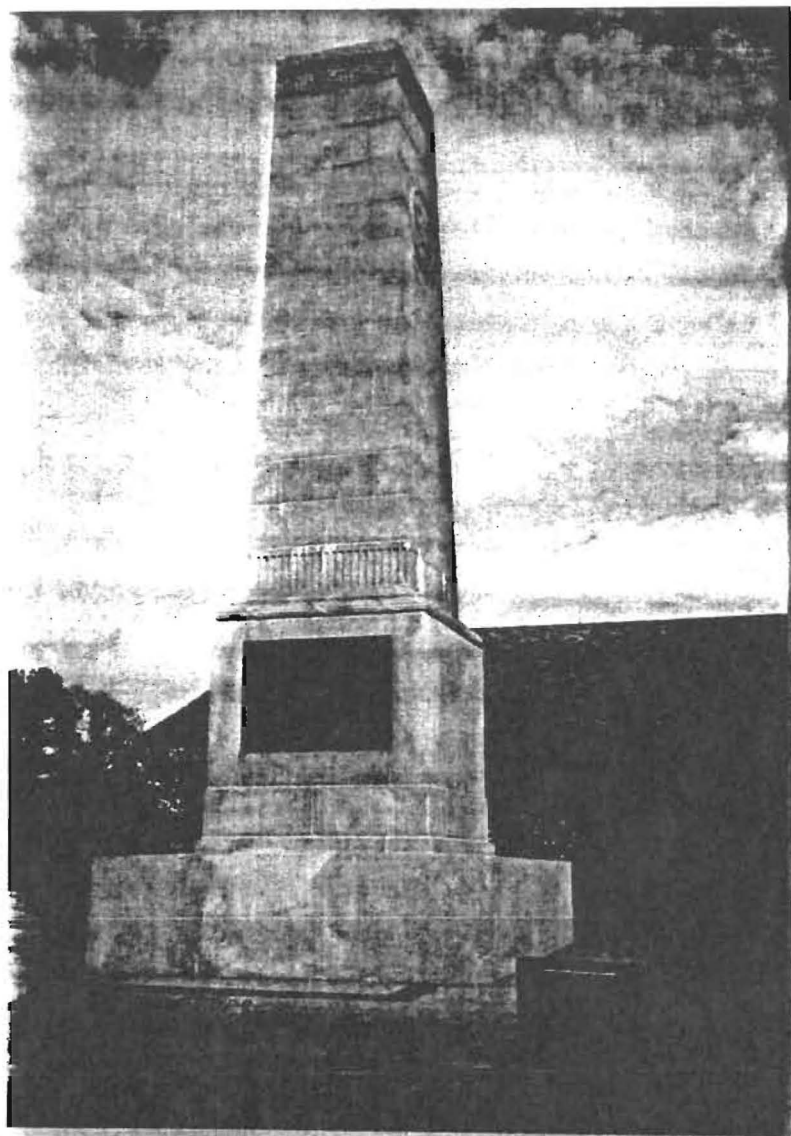
