Bluebird House Plans Offered Here Free



MRS. HUGH BARROW LOOKS AT HUSBAND'S BLUEBIRD HOUSE; PLANS FREE

The Hugh W. Barrow family, 1203 Wildwood Lane, is spearheading an effort to get bluebirds, the age-old symbol of happiness, back into Dalton. And a house, "designed to specifications," is awaiting the first bluebird sojourners in the Barrow garden. Presently it is vacant.

Mrs. Barrow says her sister, who lives on Lake Lanier, near Cumming, has had blue birds in houses she has put up for the past seven years, that they come and leave with regularity, like all good birds do, and that for this past seven years blue bird families have raised two sets of fledglings each year in the houses provided for them.

The Barrows, here about a year after having seen efforts to get bluebirds located in Delaware, are taking the lead in the bluebird undertaking.

"If it can happen in Delaware and Cumming it can happen here," Mrs. Barrow, an avid bird watcher, gardener and wild flower collector, explains. She admits she got her bluebird house up too late this year, hopes it will "weather," and that it will be occupied, come next spring. The garden at the Barrow home is beautiful and any bluebird would be crazy not to take up residence there.

Mrs. Barrow hopes the garden clubs of Dalton will take an interest in putting up homes for these loveliest of birds peculiarly associated with Southern gardens, where they more than justify their protection by eating insects. She hopes the Girl Scouts, the Boy Scouts and all in-

terested in birds will help to attract the bluebirds to return.

Mr. Barrow, equally as interested, wrote to Washington for information about how to build a bluebird house that might attract them. Businesslike, he paid for an ad in this newspaper to say these plans were free. They still are, at the above address, zip code 30720. Ask for one. This is their project.

Older residents will recall how bluebirds used to prefer nesting in holes in pasture fence posts, these holes usually having been made earlier by woodpeckers hunting for worms. The beak of the bluebird is not strong enough to chip wood away, so they must find ready made places to nest.

Like the blue martin, so loved in the South, the bluebirds love open spaces for housing; a small bird, they dread sudden onrushes from predators from heavily forested areas. As a small boy I used to wonder why martins would not nest in the more elaborate houses we put up for them in selected places, while they would gladly nest in cigar boxes put up by the tenants on our plantation. SPACE was the answer, but bluebirds take less notice of space, if ample housing is provided. They are game and beautiful, if small, birds.

As soon as we put up houses in open areas the martins came, to our chagrin. The bluebirds, like wrens (one once built a nest in a coat pocket of a coat left too long on the side gallery) felt at home, protected. They knew they were.

More recently, strange things have happened to bluebirds. Ornithologists differ about this, and

only God knows the answer. But are migratory birds, of which the bluebirds are one, guided by stars or instinct. No satisfactory answer has yet been given to this, and much learned material exists to support either opinion.

Six or eight years ago the bluebirds got their stars or instincts all mixed up, and many thousands of them, instead of following their usual migratory routes home from South America flew out of course to their death in the Atlantic. Many ship captains reported finding hundreds of them dead or near dying from exhaustion on the decks of their ships. I do know the bluebirds were confused; during a driving rainstorm on an early spring day I happened to glance out of an upstairs window and saw one awfully wet bluebird take shelter in a gourd where they usually nested. He did not stay; possibly his mate had followed the "wrong stars."

Louis J. Williams, who served as president of the Chattanooga Audubon Society for many years, and has been making birchouses for about as long, said the other night that Mrs. Mary Keefe, bluebird enthusiast at the University of the South, at Nashville, Tenn., had ordered about 30 bluebird houses and reported no vacancies.

If you want bluebirds back in Dalton and are willing to put up a house as an invitation, when pasture fence posts and willing woodpeckers are becoming a thing of the past, drop a line to Mr. Barrow, head of the bluebird housing authority in Dalton.

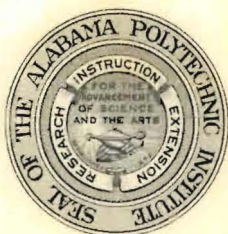

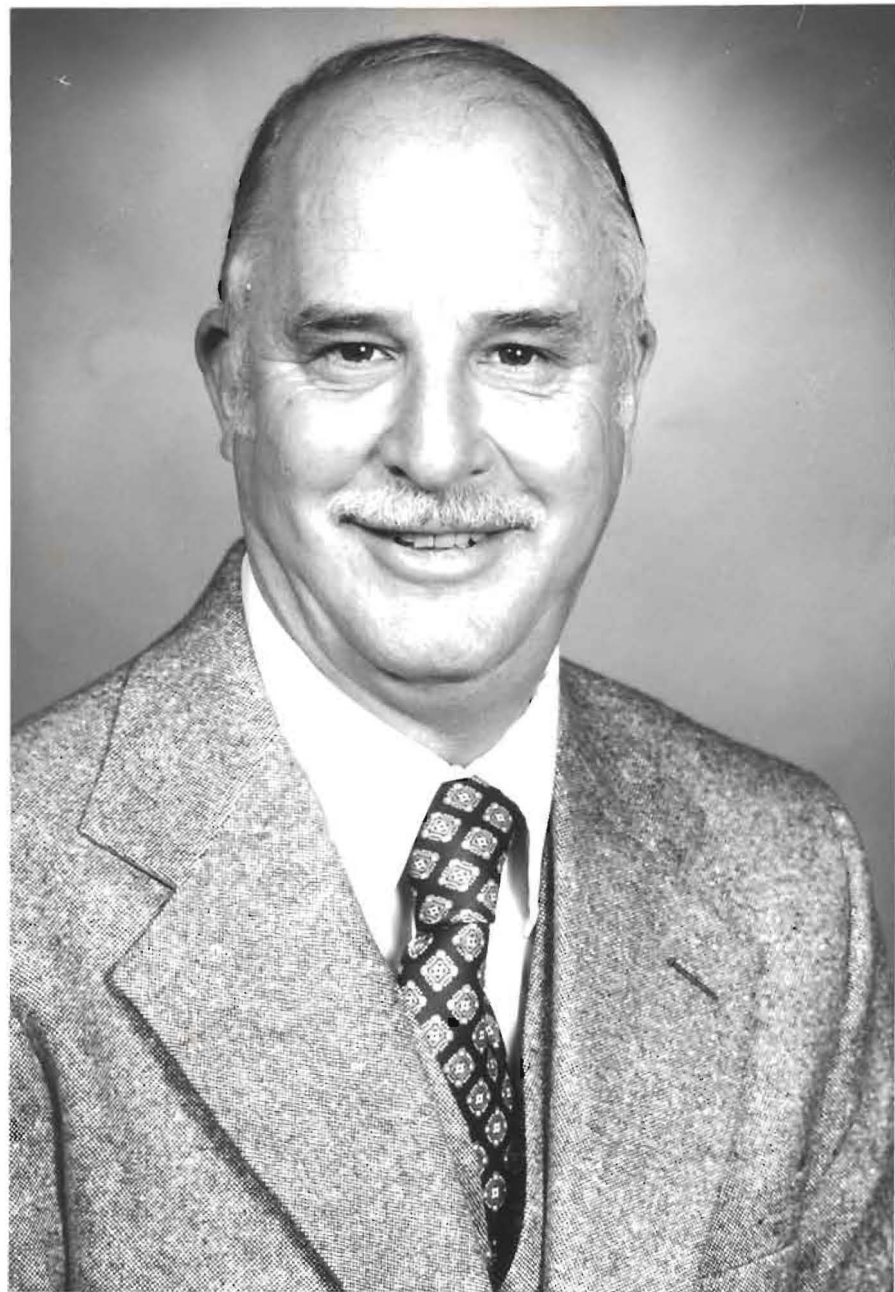

This patent is for a method of dyeing cellulose fibers with various classes of dyes including Fiber Reactive & Direct dyes without the use of NaCl (Salt). Normally large quantities of Salt is required adding greatly to the effluent stream. This method modifies the cellulose to make it "Reactive" thus accepting the dyes.

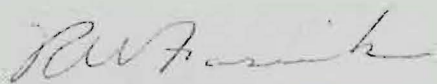

The 1860 census indicates that there were 50 families and 304 residents of Bowdon, Georgia. A devastating fire that year destroyed about

three-fourths of the stores. Bowdon was rebuilding. On the western side of town the Bowdon Collegiate Institute was thriving with an enrollment of around 140. Dr. Charles A. McDaniel served not only as the president, but also as the pastor of the Methodist Protestant Church.

Graduation was moved up for the Class of 1861 from July to May. Professor

McDaniel started drilling his cadets, not for just their finals, but for a war that was looming. Other Bowdon farmer boys started enlisting. This local contingent would become Company B of the only fighting unit mentioned by name by Margaret Mitchell in the epic, *Gone With the Wind*, Cobb's Legion.

James Reeves (Jimmy) Barrow was born in Bowdon on October 3, 1844, the son of a Baptist preacher. Three months before his seventeenth birthday, young Barrow became Private Barrow, and marched off to war with boyhood friends and fellow cadets at Bowdon College serving under Captain McDaniel, now, his commanding officer. Jimmy Barrow was the great grandfather of Hugh W. "Bill" Barrow, author of *Private James R. Barrow and Company B Cobb's Legion Infantry*.

First released in 1996, this documentary is now in its third (and revised) printing. Barrow explains the reason for his work: "The purpose of this book is not to write another history of the Civil War or to detail any of the battles fought during its four long years. It is to try to pre-

serve for my children, grandchildren, and future generations of Barrows along with any other interested parties, an account of their ancestor's Confederate service. It is the story of Company B of Cobb's Georgia Legion Infantry itself."

Do you remember those "A day in the life of" books? This marvelous volume is more like a couple of years so in the life of ordinary country boys from Carroll County who just happened to come along at one of the most extraordinary junctures in our country's history.

Barrow told me, "I have tried to make this a day by day account of the almost four long years of the service of these men and boys from our neighborhoods. Where they were, what they were doing, how far they marched, names of their camps, their activities in the numerous battles they were engaged in and unfortunately their losses in these battles".

How far did they march? Company B was right there at Appomattox when Lee surrendered. It is the opinion of the author that "Cobb's Legion will live in history as one of the greatest fighting units of all time".

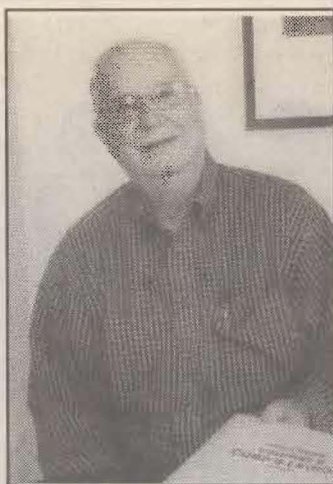
Local historians honored

Three local historians received awards for historic preservation at the Carroll County Historical Society annual dinner on April 26, 2006. The Society's Preservation and Awards Dinner was held at Sunset Hills Country Club.

Dr. Mel Steele received an award for Preservation of Political Documents from the Historical Society. The Ingram Library at the University of West Georgia is home to the "Georgia Political Heritage Program" where Mel serves as Director. The library serves as a depository for the political papers and videos/audio tapes of political figures of regional interest as well as eight governors, many state and U.S. Representatives, Newt Gingrich and even the entire office of Tom Murphy. He has many boxes of papers and tapes that are now waiting for space in an expansion in the Special Collections area of the library, but has hopes to have a building someday on the campus of UWG to house these important documents.

Dr. Steele came to West Georgia College in 1964 where he enjoyed teaching as he inspired his students to get excited about history. One of the highlights of his career was recently being chosen by the governor to sit on the Georgia Civil War Commission. Their mission is working to identify and provide funds for preservation of all Civil War sites in the state.

Preservation. Pyle is a member of both the local Sons of Confederate Veterans Camp and the Carroll County Genealogical Society. His Civil War interest lies mainly in the life of the common Confederate soldier. In 1980, he re-chartered the McDaniel-Curtis Camp No. 165, Sons of Confederate Veterans. He has worked hard to preserve the memory of Carroll County's Confederate Veterans. He has worked hard to preserve the memory of Carroll County's Confederate Veterans. He has done it all from reenacting to researching the everyday soldier of the 1860s. He dresses in period uniforms of the Confederate soldier for the living history talks he does at schools, community events and festivals. He also has led the efforts of the McDaniel-Curtis Camp to locate, clean up, and mark over 800 Confederate gravesites. Each April 26, he heads up Confederate Memorial Day activities in Carrollton. Pyle was instrumental in helping to erect the Dixie Street-1865 Historical

Marker in 1996, and in 2006 took part in the Carroll County Historical Society's "Ghost Walk on Adamson Square" where he portrayed the Ghost of William Ezra Curtis of the Carroll Guards. He is currently serving on the Carroll County Cemetery Oversight Committee.

Hugh Barrow is known by his family and friends as "Bill". He was born in Bowdon, attended Bowdon High School, and served in the US Navy during World War II aboard ship in the Pacific. Hugh returned home and married his high school sweetheart, Bonnie Jeanne Spruill of the Smithfield community after discharge from the Navy.

He graduated from West Georgia Junior College and Alabama Polytechnic Institute, now Auburn University, with degrees in both Chemical Engineering and Textile Chemistry.

He was employed by the DuPont Company for 40 years in technical, marketing and management positions. After retiring from DuPont, he was a consultant to several chemical and textile companies. He developed procedures for giving denim fabric the pre-washed, worn and distressed look holding several patents.

Hugh and Bonnie have 4 children and 5 grandchildren. They moved back to Carroll County four years ago after being away for 54 years.

Hugh is a member of the Carroll County and Bowdon Historical Societies, Carroll County Genealogical Society and, both Hugh and Bonnie are members of the Tanner Hospital Auxiliary.

J.R. was a 16-year-old member of Bowdon Collegiate Institute and Charles McDaniel's Company of Bowdon men and boys who formed Company B of the famous Cobb's Legion. His book eventually became the only published history of Cobb's Legion and is in its third printing, being widely accepted by Civil War historians as the definitive history of Colonel T. R. Cobb's, Infantry unit from Georgia. Carroll County had 2 companies in the Legion, Company B "Bowdon Volunteers:" of Bowdon and Company F "The Powell's Invincibles" from the Villa

Rica Area. It should be noted that the only unit mentioned in Margaret Mitchell's GONE WITH THE WIND is Cobb's Legion.

He has researched and written several other histories of Carroll County Civil War units - the latest being a collection of histories of the major units that Carroll County men served in during the War Between the States.

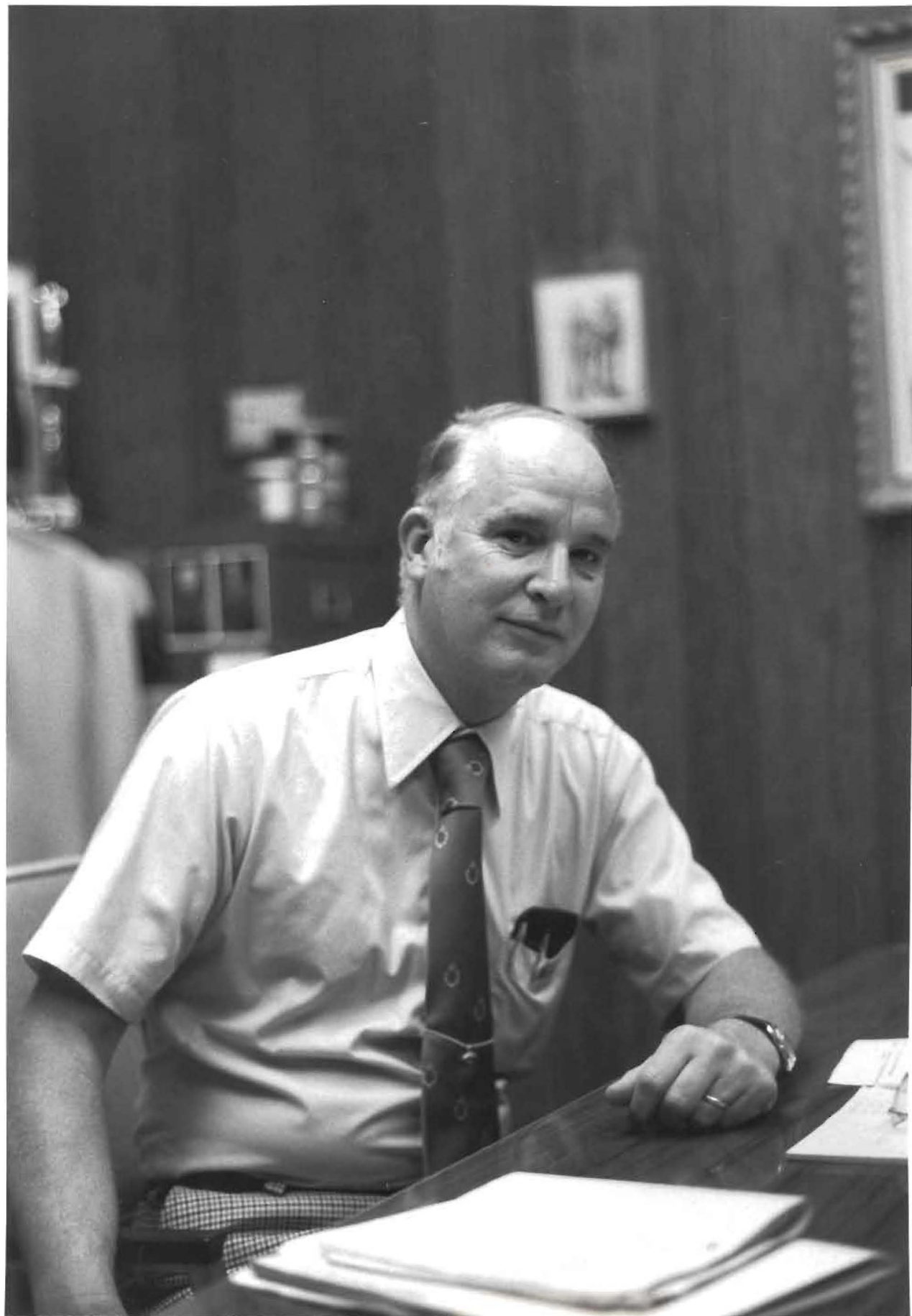

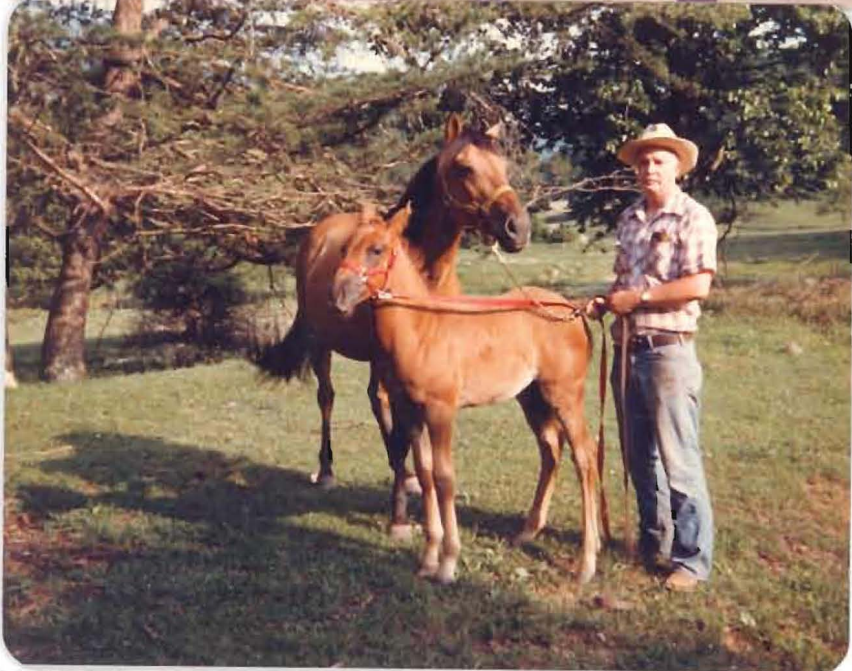

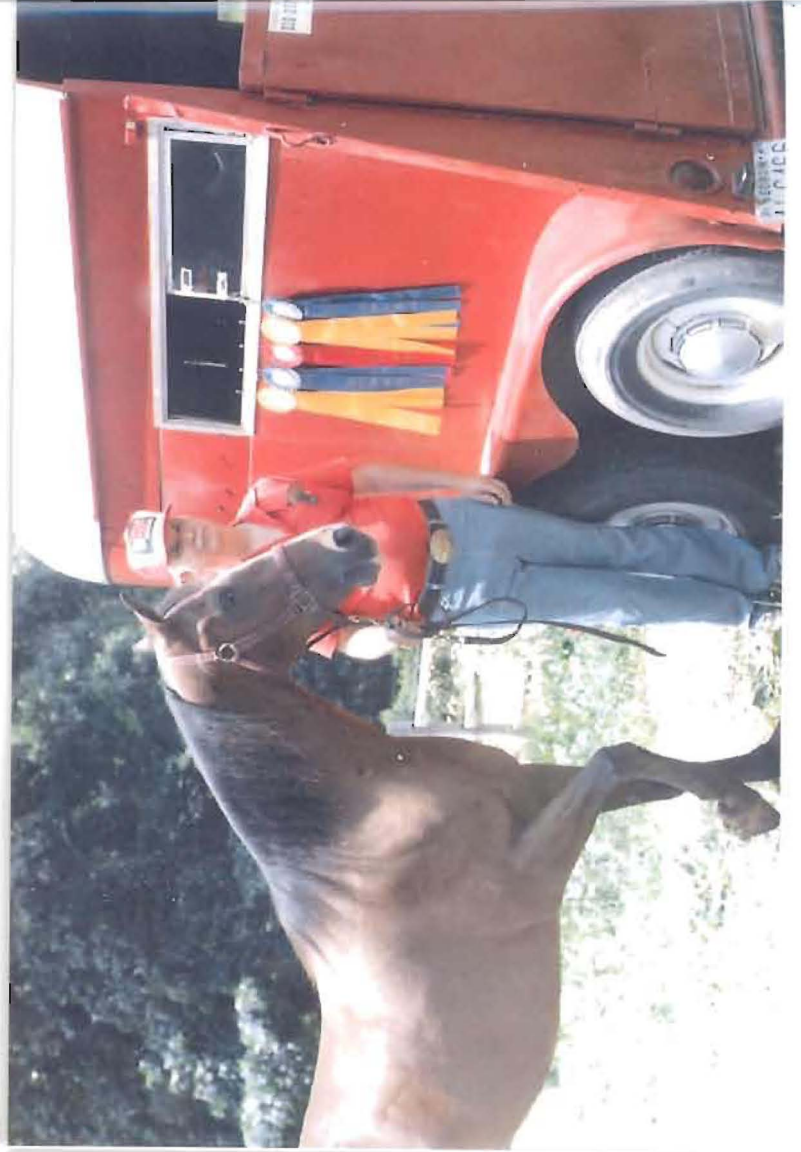
