Historic Lumpkin home being restored as inn

DAHLONEGA — History...The old home on West Main Street just seethes it. For visitors to Dahlonega next year, the structure may be the perfect opportunity to experience an overnight trip back through time.

Built almost 140 years ago in 1845, the Worley homestead had fallen on hard times. Its timbers were sagging, and water damage and general neglect were taking a heavy toil. It was a wrecking ball's dream, but no more.

Named after the late Capt. W.J. Worley, whose family and descendants owned the home from 1872 to 1932, the homestead today appears to be on the verge of salvation. For history-conscious Dahlonega residents, this should be good news, since the home has historic value equaled by few other residences in the city.

It was the great-grandaughter of Capt. Worley who repurchased the old family home this year and is securing its preservation today. She is presently involved in the project of completely restoring the home to its pre-Civil War flavor and designing it into a "bed and breakfast inn" which she hopes to open to customers this spring.

"We had been watching the old homeplace for years," said Mitzi Francis, who now makes her home in Naples, Fla. "I had always been interested in buying it back, but the opportunity had just never been there."

"I finally was able to get it back this year," she continued, "but it became so expensive to restore it that my husband and I decided we would have to make it some type of commercial venture. That's where we got the bed and breakfast inmidea."

It is the history of the home which Mrs. Francis hopes will attract overnight lodgers. Aside from the fact that it is to be competely restored to pre-Civil War trappings, numerous historic aspects of the home and the historic times of the Dahlonega area through which the home has survived will be relied upon to attract visitors.

The structure, when newly constructed in 1846 for instance, witnessed Dahlonega citizens marching away to Texas and Mexico to fight in the Mexican War — from which many did not return.

The old home also stood in 1849 as U.S. Mint assayer Matthew F. Stephenson mounted the courthouse steps just down the street and implored miners and citizens not to leave the community for the wilds of California and the gold rush there.


It stood in 1861 as Dahlonega's proud men and boys in gray marched off to the Civil War. Capt. Worley was one of these men and was captain of Company D as the 1st Georgia State Volunteers.

In 1864 when Gen. William Tecumseh Sherman burned Atlanta, Capt. Worley fought for the Confederacy in the Battle of Atlanta. Unlike most of his comrades, Worley lived to tell of his experiences to fascinated grand-childlen gathered around the hearth in the old home.

From the early 1900's right up to the present time, cadets at North Georgia College, some of whom are prominent today, boarded in the old home as they struggled through the college. Brig. Gen. Burton Patrick (NGC class of '57), who is today deputy chief of Congressional liaison at the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., lived in the Worley home while a cadet at the college.

It is the connection with Capt. Worley and North Georgia College which provides much of the historical backdrop for the structure. Worley, who died in the home in 1913, was one of the most colorful citizens in Dahloenga history.

In 1873 when North Georgia College was established, Worley was one of the first members of the board of

trustees there. He was also clerk of the Superior Court of Lumpkin County for many years, and at the time of his death was a United States commissioner.

He dabbled continuously in real estate ventures. One of his investments was Porter Springs, a popular resort north of Dahlonega in the early 1900's which is now a ghost town.

Though Worley would be pleased that his home is being restored, he undoubtedly would be confused by some of the modern conveniences.

"We plan to but a bath (antique of

course), a telephone and heating in each of the seven rooms of the home," Francis explains, "but all flooring, woodwork, and antique furnishings will be restored. There will also be a fireplace restored in each of the rooms."

All of the rooms, according to Mrs.

Francis, will also be named for an unusual member of the Worley family who lived there. Two family members who she says will surely get exposure will be Capt. Worley and his daughter Lee Anna, who was a graduate of North Georogia College and a long-time librarian at the college.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I enjoyed reading Dr. Carole Scott's article in the Aug. 23 edition of *The Carroll Star News* which told of Georgians making the trip out west to California as '49er's and later to Montana on other gold rushes plus recent articles concerning gold mining in Carroll and Lumpkin counties and just who was the first to mine gold in Georgia.

My great grandfather, Columbus ("Lum") W. Worley, was one of the miners who made the trip. "Lum" was the son of James and the grandson of William who both were speculators or miners who came to Georgia from the Carolinas soon after gold was discovered around Dahlonega. They owned stakes in several mines in the area and in addition owned 1/3 interest in copper mines located in Fannin County and other copper producing areas of North Georgia and Tennessee. They owned considerable property in and around Dahlonega and Lumpkin County including acreage which they sold to the United States Government for the creation of United States Mint and which today is the campus of North Georgia University. In fact, "The Worley House" exists today as a B&B just across the highway from the entrance of the college.

The 20 year old "Lum" left for Montana in early 1860 to seek his fortune. He left records that he, "Had 3,000 feet of dry gulch claims on Willis Gulch, 2 claims 50 X 100 feet on Golden Gulch, 2 claims on Spring Field Patch diggings, 2 Lode claims on Stone Lode north of Russel Gulch, 2 claims in central city." Because of the illness of his father and the threat of the Civil War, he was forced to abandon his claims in the late spring of 1861 and return to Dahlonega, a 30 day trip. He had left his claims with a "Yankee" Jewish friend from Philadelphia, Israel Lobach, whom he had met and worked with in Montana. "Lum" wrote, "I had found [Lobach] to be an honest man with a power of attorney to dispose of [my property]."

Back home, "Lum" enlisted very early into a company, "The Dahlonega Volunteers", which became Company H, a part of the famous 1st Georgia Infantry. The 1st was sent to Virginia and stayed there for almost a year and then came back to Georgia and was disbanded. "Lum" and his men reenlisted and became Company D, 52nd Georgia Infantry. He became the captain of the company which was involved in numerous battles including Perryville, Cumberland Gap, the Vicksburg campaign where they were surrendered to General Grant, back in service in time for Missionary Ridge in Nov., 1863, the entire Atlanta campaign where he was seriously wounded again at New Hope Church, this time, in the chest. This wound bothered him for the remainder of his life. He recovered in time to join Gen. Hood on his disastrous trip into Tennessee and the battles of Franklin and Nashville in late 1864. He was wounded again and left on the retreat at Columbus, MS with other wounded. He made his way back to Dahlonega and there rounded up members of his company and others and left to rejoin the Confederate army now resisting General Sherman in the Carolinas. His group was in Augusta when the war ended.

Sometimes in 1862 while "Lum" was in the army, he received a letter from his "friend" Lobach stating, "He was sorry for the split of the icy north and the sunny south but he would prove true to me." This was the last he ever heard from him. After the war, he learned that Lobach had sold his property and built a large brick building in Hellina City [Helena?]. He was never able to get in touch with Lobach and after the war his and his family's property and wealth was all lost and he could not afford to go west looking for Lobach.

In April, 1862, "Lum" married Miss "Lizzie" Barnes in Dahlonega. "Lizzie's" family were also miners and had come to North Georgia from North Carolina when gold was discovered there. In fact, her grandfather, Enos Barnes, was a 49'er who organized and led a group of Lumpkin County men across country to California and died of pneumonia near Sutter's Mill and was buried there. We have tried to located his burial site but with no success. We know that the family sent money to a doctor out there to cover the cost of a burial and for a grave marker.

"Lizzie's" grandmother and her children moved to Carroll County land that Enos had purchased "sight unseen" because gold had been discovered nearby at what was known as Bonner's Gold Mine. Soon, "Lum" and "Lizzie" followed them and purchased a farm south of Carrollton near Roopville, raised a family and lived there most of their lives. "Lum" farmed and was a deputy sheriff. They are buried in the Carrollton City Cemetery. "Lum" and "Lizzie" were my great grandparents, parents of Martha ("Mattie") who married John Thomas Spruill, my grandfather, and the parents of John Marvin, my father.



Huddleston

The exact family lineage of many of those belonging to the Huddleston family here in American is very difficult to trace. The Huddleston line is known to be Irish—as can be seen in the reddish tint in their hair and an Irish temper that often gets them into trouble. The difficulty is tracing the exact lineage is due to the fact that the same names are used over and over and the family group often stays close together. The earlier Huddleston had sons named John, David, and William. These sons also had sons named John, David, and William. My ancestor was William Berry Huddleston, who was born in 1794 in Rutherford County, North Carolina. I know that his father's name was William Huddleston. However, when I checked the 1800 Rutherford County, NC Census, I found three William Huddleston's with male children between the ages of 0 and 10. I know that these three William's are the sons of three brothers; however, I cannot document exactly which William is which.

William Berry Huddleston was born in 1794 in Rutherford County, NC. He is found in his adulthood in Georgia. He served as a Constable in Coweta County, GA. On 18 September 1824, he married Mary Jane (Polly) Howard in Pike County, Georgia. They continued to move around in Georgia, but by the time the 1840 Census was taken, Berry and Polly Huddleston were living in Randolph County, Alabama. So far they are known to have had eleven children who lived to adulthood—seven sons and four daughters. If this family was like others of this time, there were also probably several children that died as infants.

This family is one of those Southern families who has every reason to be proud of their family during the Civil War. Berry and Polly Huddleston had five sons who served during the Civil War. Their oldest son, William Berry Huddleston, Jr. was born about 1825. He died 9 November 1861 from a disease contracted while in the service. Thomas Marion Huddleston was born in 1831. He fought with Company E, 17th Alabama Infantry. He was discharged and sent home after being shot through the leg in the Battle of Resaca, Georgia. David Franklin Huddleston was born in 1836. He served with Company E, 17th Alabama Infantry. He was taken prisoner by the North and stayed as a prisoner

of war at Rock Island, NY, until the end of the war. Jesse N. Huddleston, born in 1843, could not find a group in Alabama when he became ready to fight. He traveled across the lines to Heard County, Georgia, where he joined Company E, 19th Georgia Infantry. James Ira Huddleston was born in 1846. He was too young to join the Confederate States Army, so he joined one of the Home Guards at the age of 16. He joined Co.A, Capt. Jeff Falkner's Mounted Infantry, Home Guards. William Berry Huddleston, Jr. died in the war. When Jesse N. and David Franklin Huddleston returned from the war, there was nothing left--their families had been unable to plant and harvest crops to keep the farms going. With nothing here, David and Jesse with their families moved to Texas. Part of Jesse's family later returned to Georgia to live, but all of David's family is still in Texas. Thomas Marion Huddleston later drew a pension for his service, because the damage done to his leg contined to get worse with each passing year. James Ira Huddleston completed his time with the Home Guard. When Clay County, Alabama, was created in 1866, Ira took his family with him to this new county with new land waiting to be farmed.

Berry and Polly lived in a community called Lamar. It was located near the Little Tallapoosa River. There was a mill on the river and people always crossed there as many of the businesses needed were on the other side of the river. The following is the story handed down through the family regarding the death of William Berry Huddleston, Sr. One of the neighbors, who lived across the river, had come to Berry to tell him of an upcoming trip to get supplies and asked if they needed anything (since he had to go anyway). Berry told him that they needed some green coffee. The day of the trip arrived, so Berry made the trip across the millpond and visited the neighbor to pick up the coffee. After a short visit with this neighbor, Berry was returning home. No one is sure of exactly what happened in the next few minutes. As Berry was crossing the millpond, something happened that bumped or jerked the boat. As the boat jerked, Berry, who was standing up in the boat, was thrown in the river. He was a good swimmer, but apparently no matter how hard he struggled he could not get upright and out of the water. When he was found later, either his pant's leg or his shoe string was caught some way on the side of the boat. This was the reason why he could not struggle free . to get upright and get his head out of the water. Berry Huddleston

was 74 years old when he drowned in the Little Tallapoosa River in 1868. He is buried in the Providence Baptist Church Cemetery.

No one knows the exact time of Polly Huddleston's death, but we do know that she was still alive when the 1880 Census was taken.


She is buried in the same cemetery as her husband. (but different /of)

Thomas Marion Huddleston, Sr. was born in 1831. Service in the Civil War left him with a crippled leg, due to a gunshot wound in his leg. The wound did not heal correctly and the problems with it increased every year. An interesting note to this injury--after he was shot through the leg he found the bullet in his boot once he took it off so that could treat his wound. About 1857, Tom married Lucinda J. Cates Holderfield, the widow of Willis B. Holderfield of Heard County, Ga. She had five children. Tom and Lucinda had two boys before she died. About 1863 Tom married Mary Jane Parmer, the daughter of James Henry Parmer and Litia (Lishie) Prescott. They had ten children--six boys and four girls. As Mary Jane was giving birth to their tenth child, complications of some type developed and she died during childbirth. This tenth child was a little girl and they gave her mother's name to her -- Mary Jane. This little baby was so precious to the brothers and sisters who had to help take care of her that they all called her "Sugar" or "Sug". Much later Tom Huddleston married Senie Virgilin Parmer Daniel, the sister of Mary Jane Parmer. Rather unusual for that time was the fact that Senie was divorced from her first husband -- J. Gabriel "Gabe" Daniel. Senie had three daughters from her marriage to Gabe. After Senie married Tom, they had one child that died as an infant and three sons who lived to adulthood.

No one knows the place of burial for his first wife, Lucinda. His second wife, Mary Jane Parmer Huddleston, is buried in an unmarked grave in the Providence Methodist Church Cemetery in Clay County, AL. Senie is buried in the Prospect Congregational Methodist Church Cemetery in Randolph County, Alabama. Thomas Marion Huddleston died on 15 March 1906. He is buried in the Prospect Congregational Methodist Church Cemetery.

Mary Jane Huddleston was born on 29 October 1887 in Clay County, Alabama. She was the tenth (and final) child of her parents. On 12 February 1903, she married James Franklin Harrington in Randolph County, Alabama.


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Co E - 19th GA Infinitary


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Oldest synagogue in New World found

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — An old stone building used for fuel storage in the Caribbean island of Nevis may be what remains of the oldest Jewish synagogue in the Western hemisphere, researchers say.

"We don't know for sure, but there are various aspects about the building that seem to indicate it could have been a synagogue or part of a synagogue," said Robert N. Zeitlin, an anthropology professor at Brandeis University, in Waltham, Mass.

Many historians believe a synagogue must have existed in Nevis, part of the two-island state of St. Kitts-Nevis, because of its Jewish population in the 17th century.

Large numbers of Jews fled to

Large numbers of Jews fled to the British and Dutch colonies in the Caribbean to escape the Spanish Inquisition, which began in the 15th century

in the 15th century.

Nevis Museum Curator David Robinson inspected the one-room site in February and found Mediterranean-style vaulted ceilings and stonework not usually found in Nevis. The site is next to the Charlestown government building.

Zeitlin said a footpath from it leads to the island's Jewish cemetery about a block away. He said initial research shows the building could have been a bathhouse used for initiation rituals.

"We believe the standing building was part of a larger building such as a synagogue because we discover a foundation or bases for columns," said Zeitlin, who is part of a three-member archaeological team.



After her decease (sell and divide the money between my six oldest children) Elizabeth Horton, William Allen, Barsheba Barnes, Fanny Allen, Polly Allen, and Hezekiah Allen. I also lend to my wife cows and calves of her choice, one bay mare by the name of Fan, 12 heads of hogs of her choice, 4 heads of sheep of her choice, one bed and furniture. Also my largest table, 6 chairs, one chest(called my wife's chest), one earthern dish, 6 ditto dishes, one wheel, one pair of chards, one flax wheel and my smallest pot, 6 heads of geese. All the last mentioned property(after the decease of my wife) equally divided among my youngest, Melinda, Harris, Briant. I also give my wife and her family a plentifid supply of privisons for one year support.

I also give and bequeath to my daughter, Melinda, one negro girl by the name of Minervy and in case of her death to Harris and Briant Allen.

I give to Harris Allen one negro boy by name of Richard. In case he dies goes to daughter Melinda and Briant Allen.

I also give my daughter one feather bed and Furniture. I also give my daughter Fanny one bed and furniture. I also give my wife one woman's saddle. I give Willie Spears the bed and furniture whereupon he now sleeps.




