

Map 9. Battle of Champion Hill. Hovey's and Logan's advance, and the defeat of Barton's and Cumming's brigades, 10:30 a.m. to 1 p.m., May 16, 1863. As soon as contact was established with the Union columns advancing via the Raymond and Middle roads, Gen. Pemberton posted his three divisions along the ridge commanding Jackson Creek. About 9 a.m. Pemberton tearned from Gen. S. D. Lee (one of Stevenson's brigade commanders) that a strong Federal force was approaching along the Jackson road. To cope with this threat, Lee shifted his brigade to the left, moving to the crest of Champion Hill. Here he was reinforced by three of Cumming's regiments and parts of two batteries.

By 10:30 Gens. Hovey and Logan had deployed their divisions in the fields near the Champion house. Gen. McPherson gave

the word and the two divisions advanced. Lee, seeing that Logan's right would outflank him, called for help. Barton's brigade was rushed cross-country from the Roberts house and formed on Lee's left.

A savage contest now ensued. Hovey's division, spearheaded by McGinnis' brigade, smashed Cumming's regiments at the salient angle, capturing four cannon. Stevenson's brigade of Logan's division routed Barton's brigade. With the brigades to their right and left in retreat, Lee's Alabamians retired to the Jackson road. Hovey's left brigade, Slack's, now drove ahead and at the crossroads scattered the 56th and the 57th Georgia and captured Waddell's battery. By I p.m. Pemberton's left had been mauled and hurled back; his army was threatened with destruction.



Pemberton now realized that the ur Union divisions feeling their way along the Raymond and addle roads did not constitute as grave a threat to his army as overy's and Logan's bluecoats. Staff officers were sent by emberton to direct Generals Bowen and Loring to rush their visions to the left to reinforce Stevenson's battered brigades. owen and Loring refused to go, pointing out that there were asses of Union troops to their front. When Pemberton repeated overder, Bowen at 1:30 put his division in motion for the overdads.

As Bowen passed the Roberts house, he had Cockrell form is brigade to the lest of the plantation (Ratliff) road; Green's rigade deployed on Cockrell's right. Storming sorward, Bowen's cops overwhelmed Slack's brigade and recaptured Waddell's

battery. McGinnis' brigade of Hovey's division tried to check Bowen's onslaught, but was driven back in confusion. Bowen's troops swept on and reached the crest of Champion Hill, where they captured two guns of the 16th Ohio Battery. Lee's Alabamians now launched a savage counterattack on Logan's left. For a short time it looked as if the Confederates might rout Grant's right and capture the army's trains parked in the fields near the Champion house.

A fresh Union division, Crocker's, now reached the field. Sanborn's brigade was rushed to Logan's assistance, while Boomer's brigade plugged the gap ripped in the Union line by the retreat of Hovey's troops. Sixteen guns were massed by Hovey, so they could enfilade Bowen's line of advance. Once again, the tide of battle turned, and Bowen's troops were compelled to give ground.

Worley

This is an English place name acquired from once having lived in the parish of Warley Salop in Worcestershire. This parish went by the spelling Worley for almost 200 years (1400-1600) during the time surnames were becoming hereditary in England. The meaning is "clearing of, or by, the Worf." Worf was the name of a stream running through the parish.

No record of individuals could be found in the early records in any of the shires.

In Virginia, Elizabeth Worley was noted in Lancaster County in 1652. William Worleigh assigned (sold, traded?) 650 acres to John Banister in 1653. This land was situated on Mobjack Bay in Gloucester-Lancaster counties. Peter Worley (or Worsley) was noted in Old Rappahannock County in 1667, Mary Worley was noted in Kent County in 1672 and George Worley was noted there in 1691. 4

Everybody here knew the frank, genial, and honest face of Captain Lum Worley. "None knew him but to love him." There was no trace of sham in his makeup. His life was an open book "known and read by all men," who were so fortunate as to share his acquaintance.

Captein Worley was born in Dahlonega, Ga; was amrried to Miss Lizzie Barnes, in Cerroll County in April, 1862.

He first enlisted as a private in Company H, First Georgia Infantry Farch 18th, 1861, for 12 months. He was one of the very first volunteers of the war.

When the 12 months expired he re-enlisted in the same company and regiment and was appointed adjutant of his regiment -- a post of honor-and so acted until his company called him back, by voluntarily and unanimously electing him first lieutenant of the company.

When his captain retired from being severly wounded at New Hope he was promoted to the captaincy, which office he filled with marked distinction to the final surrender.

Atter the surrender her with 100 others, underbook to go to the Confederate forces in the West, but never quite reached them.

Captain Worley took part in many memorable engagements, among which was Laurel Hill and Caror Ford, Cheat Mountain, Green Briar, Reidville, Cumberland Gap, Perryville, Ky., Franklin, Tenm., Lookout Mountain, Missionary Ridge, Vicksburg, New Hope, Atlanta, Resacca, and others.

He was wounded- three ribs fractured -by a piece of bombshell, at the Battle of Atlanta, July 22nd, 1864; was also wounded by a minnie ball below the right knee in the leg.

He was a pensioner and was awarded the "Gross of Honor."

I gather these facts from his written statements furnished me proious to his death, and I knew the man and am satisfied of the truth of them. Under the head os Special Remarks," Captain Worley says, "Well, there's so many just like my experience, that I don't know that it would do any good.


"After my captain was disabled, I was captain and it looked like they always detailed my company when they wanted a bad job done.
