JAMES H. WORLEY

James H Worley, father of "Lum", was born in South Carolina in 1807 and married Mildred ("Millie") Donaldson (b 1812-d 3 Sept., 1880 at Dahlonega, Ga.). She was born in South Carolina and was the daughter of William and Elizabeth Donaldson. It is thought to be that Elizabeth is of Indian blood. James H. Worley was Sheriff of Lumpkin County for 2 terms (we know that he was sheriff in 1850-52) and was Clerk of Supperior Court for 14 years. Some of these years he served in both officies as we observed documents that he signed as both sheriff and Clerk of Court in Deed Book K. Some accounts say that he owned the land where the US Mint was built but we believe that it was owned by his father William but possibly by both. He was a large land owner including lands with minerals. He was a third owner of a copper mine in Fannin County, GA... His and Millie(in his will it is spelled Milly) children were: b.28 Jan. 1835 d killed in Civil War b.29 May 1837 d. 21 Nov. 1913 Martin Van Buren William Jasper b.21 Aug.1840 b.31 July, 1842 Columbus Warren Timothy Houston Roxannah Susan Elizabeth b.1845 d. 12 Aug.1902 James John Hills b. 10 Aug. 1849 William Jasper and Timothy are buried in Mt. Hope Cemetery.

James H.'s marker in Mount Hope Cemetery, adjoining the North Georgia College campus, is a recent one and carries the inscription: JAMES H. WORLEY--1ST LIEUT. CAPTAINS BEARDEN'S CO., GA. INF.--INDIAN WARS. There is no marker for Millie or for his father William or mother(?). There are markers for William Jasper and Timothy, his sons.

Millie was a Charter Member of the Dahlonega Methodist Church. Her obituary was published in "The Signal" (Dahlonega) 3 Sept, 1880: Methodist Church--A Charter Member -- On last Sunday evning our community was shocked by the sudden and unexpected death of Mrs. Millie D. Worley. Mrs. Worley was born in Pendelton District, SC Oct. 14, 1812 and came to Lumpkin County before Dahlonega was located and was the oldest citizen of the town. She embraced the Methodist religion and joined the ME Church South while a girl. She was one of the twelve in the organization of the Methodist Church in Dahlonega which was organized in the old Accademy building before the Church House was built. is perhaps only one of those members now living. Mrs Worley lived a Christian life of Christian meekness of submission and in answer to her many prayers, lived to rear her six childern, five sons and one daughter who are all members of the Church of her choice.

Her son William J. was a Captain in the Civil War (as was Lum) and was known for the rest of his life as "Captain Bill". After the war's close he was listed as an artist but

studied the Law and became a prominent real estate lawyer in Dahlonega. He was instrumlental in the est*tablishment of North Georgia College and for many years served on the Board of Trustees, most of the time as Secretary. He was Clerk of the Superior Court for many years and served on the city council for several terms. He was a large land holder in the area and at the time of his death was United States Commissioner. He was owner of the Worley House which stands across the road from the College and now (1996) is a bed and breakfast having been restored and furnished with period antiques. The house served as home to many cadets as a boarding or rooming house.

Timothy was also a member of his brother's CSA unit and was severly wounded in Atlanta. A story in "History of Lumpkin County" states: "Not withstanding, T.H. Worley of this County was shot entirely through the body in the Battle of Atlanta, July 14, 1864 with an ounce ball, he is still able to do good shooting. On Tuesday of last week he killed a gobbler off hand with a rifle at a range of 60 yards."

Another "Sidelight" in this book states: "Slaves in Lumpkin County---Slaves were not in great number but the buying and selling of slaves before the Court House was not an unusual sight. Referring to an old copy of the "Signal" published in 1852 the statement: At that time J.H. Worley was Sheriff and sold many negroes in front of the Court House door."

William Worley, father of James H., was born in Cumberland County, Va. in 1780 and married: 1. Hannah Hutchinson, 2. Susan Eaton (Indian), 3. Elizabeth Martin Jackson. His children were Silas, Susan and James H.. William also was a large land holder in Lumpkin and other North Georgia counties and sold to the United States the land the US Mint was built on and today is the campus of North Georgia College. He received \$1,050 for 10 acres of the 37 acres he owned in this plot. We could find no will for William but did find his name on numerous deeds in Lumpkin Co. Susan was passedly the methor of Jameth As she whence a day him Susan (?).

William's father was John Worley born c1733 and married Thodocia Burdit(?). He was a Revolutionary War soldier from Cumberland County, VA. His children were Silas, Pleasant and William.

John (II)'s father was John(I) born in 1701 in VA and married Ester Blount, daughter of John Blount born 1670 VA and died 1725 in NC and Elizabeth Davis born 1679 and died 1732-33. His will was proved Feb. 1757 in Cumberland Co, VA. Their children were: Judith, Christian, Lovick(?), Joseph, Robert, Mary, Sarah, Elizabeth, and John(II).

John(I) was the son of Edward Worley, born c1673; married c1695; died c1724 at York Co., Charles Parish, VA leaving a will. The married Ester(or Hester) Blount. Ester was born 17 March, 1703 in Chowan, NC near Edenton on Albermarle Sound. John's mother was a Mary Worley.

This is as far back as we havae been able to trace the Worley line and do not know when they immigrated or from where. The Blount line however has been traced back many generations: Godefroy Le Danois, born c852 of Denmark and Gisela, Princess of Lorraine, born c865 in Lorraine, France. She was the daughter of Lothaire II, King of Lorraine. Gisela was a decendent of Chaslemagne, King of the Holy Roman Empire.

James H. Worley was the great-great-grandfather of Bonnie Jeanne Spruill Barrow. His son Columbus Warren and his wife Lizzie Barnes were the parents of Martha ("Mattie") Francis Worley who married John Thomas Spruill. John Thomas and Mattie were the parents of John Marvin Spruill who married Ruth Lillian Huddleston. Marvin and Ruth were the parents of Bonnie Jeanne.

This Marriage Lisence was found in Marriage Book B, Lumpkin County Court House, Dahlonega, Georgia. It is the lisence to be married between Columbus W. Worley and Lizzie Barnes, great grandparents of Bonnie Jeaanne Spruill Barrow. It reads:

Georgia--Lumpkin County-= To any ordained minister of the Gospel, Judge of the Supreme Court, Judge of the Inferior Court, Justice of the Peace you are hereby authorizzed to join Mr. C. W. Worley and Miss Lizzie Barnes in the holy state of matrimony according to the constitution(?) and laws (?) of the State and for so doing this shall be your sufficent _____(?) given under my hand and seal this April 14, 1862. James R. Laukin(?)

Directly below the above is:

Georgia-Lumpkin Co. I certify that on the 29th day of April. 1862 in obedience to the authority of this lisence united Mr. C.W. Worley and Miss Lizzie Barnes. L.E. Davis J.P.

The Ancestry of Esther Blount (1703 - ?)

Esther Blount was born 17 Mar 1703 of Chowan, NC. She married John Worley, born 1701 in VA. John was the son of Edward Worley, born c 1673, married c 1695, and died c 1724 at York Co., Charles Parish, VA, leaving a will. John's mother was Mary Worley, born c 1677. Esther was the daughter of

John Blount, born 17 Oct 1670 VA, died 17 Mar 1725 Mulberry Hill, Chowan Co., NC, near Edenton on Albemarle Sound. Esther's mother was Elizabeth Davis, born 1679, died 1732-33 at Mulberry Hill with her husband. They married 11 June 1695 Henrico Co., VA, living on the land at Mulberry Hill that John's father James Blount had bequeathed to him. James had patented this land in 1684; however, it is probable that he occupied the land several years before he secured his grant. The court records show that James was in Shaftsbury or Chowan Precinct in 1670, probably coming there in 1669.

John and Elizabeth had ten children, six daughters and four sons. They are the progenitors of a large and influential family in NC, and many well-known names in the state trace to these children of John Blount. These children are:

- Mary Blount, born 1696, married Jonathan Jacocks I. They both died @1735 at or near Scotch Hall in Bertie Co., NC.
- Elizabeth Blount born 1697, married Dr. Samuel Pagett. They lived and died in Edenton, NC.
- Sarah Blount, born 1699, married John Lovick, Sec. of the Colony of NC. She lived only a few years and died without children.
- 4. Martha Blount born 1702, married first Thomas West, who died in 1722, leaving two daughters, Martha West, who married Edward Bryan, of Bertie, and Elizabeth West, who married Col. Thomas Whitmell of Bertie Co., NC. Martha married second ---- Worsley.
 - 5. Esther or Hester Worley (see above)
 - John Blount, born 1706, married Sarah E. Vail, daughter of Jeremiah Vail. They succeeded to the Mulberry Hill estate and lived and died there.
 - 7. Thomas Blount, born 1708, married Elizabeth Pollock, widow of Major George Pollock, and daughter of Thomas Whitmell and his wife Elizabeth Hunter Bryan. They had two children: Whitmell Blount, who married Amelia Bryan, and was probably killed at the battle of Germantown, during the Revolutionary War, and Winnifred Blount, who married her cousin Hon. Whitmey Hill. Mrs. Elizabeth

Blount married Col. William Williams of Martin County, NC, son of William Williams and his wife Elizabeth Alston, daughter of John Alston.

- 8. James Blount, born 1710, married ---- and had two daughters: Nancy Blount, who married Dempsey Connor, son of Dempsey Connor and Mary Pendleton, great-granddaughter of Gov. Archdale (NC), and left one daughter, Frances Clark Pollock Connor, who married first Joseph Blount III, and second William Hill; and Betsy Blount, who married Jeremiah Vail, son of Jeremiah Vail. They removed to New Hanover Co., NC.
- 9. Anne Blount, born 1712, married ---- Worley.
- 10. Joseph Blount, born 1716, died 1777, married Sarah Durant, daughter of George Durant (grandson of George Durant the elder) and Hagar Crisp, daughter of Nicholas Crisp and --- Wilkins. They left many children.

John Blount was the son of

James Blount, born c 1620 of Astley, Worcestershire, England, and Ann Willis, born c 1639, of Sodington, Worcestershire, England. They married 1660, of Isle of Wight, VA. Ann was the daughter of Balthazar and Hannah ---- Willis[x]. James died 1686, Chowan Co., NC, and Ann died in Ipswich, MA. James was a Captain in the Life Guards of Charles I. His is said to be the oldest NC family. A will dated 9 Jul 1685 reads:

"Son James Blount, son Thomas Blount, two daughters Ann Slocum, and Elizabeth Hawkins, grandchildren James and Sarah Blount, children of my son Thomas and Ann Slocum, daughter of my daughter Ann Slocum, John Hawkins, son of my daughter Elizabeth Hawkins, son John Blount; wife Ann Blount sole executrix. Witnesses, John Railey, Jane Miller, William Dobson."

James and his brother Thomas Blount (grandfather of William Blount, first governor of TN) came to VA together equipped with money and a family crest. Prior to that, on 13 Sept 1655, the following came to America bound to James [Blunt] to serve in Virginia: Thomas Taylor of Lugwardine, Heref, labourer, for 6 years; Rebecca Davis of Grosmont, Monmouth, spinster, for 3 years; and Anne Morgan of Rowlstone, Heref, spinster, for 3 years.

Early the Blounts moved to Chowan Precinct in present NC in search of better and cheaper lands for their tobacco plantations. James patented a tract of land there known as Mulberry Hill, a showplace home with fresh-water springs and carefully planted orchards. He was a leader in Culpepper's Rebellion, was a burgess, a member of the governor's council, and a leading citizen.

Blount land and slaves were bought, sold, and leased to work on shares. Blount mills ground the essential corn or sliced the boards of the community for cash or barter. Blount carpenters and coopers made wagons, staves, and shingles, and Blount forges served both farmers and soldiers for profit.

ing plans Few hoped to receive from Philadelphia did not come, he decided to begin work anyway. In Dahlonega he found the residents annoyed at the delay in erecting the mint, a full two months having elapsed since passage of the bill authorizing its construction. They were losing from six to eight percent in exchanging their gold for currency, so to them time was of the essence. The delay in getting started, and the tension between citizens of Dahlonega and mint officials was an omen of things to come.

The first delay came with the selection of the site. Few described the village of Dahlonega to officials in Washington. It was located on forty acres of land, one of the original tracts in the gold country lottery. Streets ran diagonally across the tract, and the small town lots were laid off among the knobs and ravines of the mountainside on which it was located. No suitable site for the mint existed within the town itself, but an elevated ridge just north and west of the town provided some good tableland. Less desirable sites were available on the three remaining squares that bordered the town. Few selected six sites he thought would do, marked them A through F, and sent detailed descriptions to Washington. His first preference was for one of the three sites, A, B, or C, located just north of the town on land owned by a Mr. Cassidy of Savannah. These were on the "healthy" and respectable side of town and offered a fine view of the town and adjacent hills. The water supply was good and there was probably gold as well. Although any of these three would have been admirable, acquiring one of them required a long trip to Savannah to see Cassidy, a trip that might be useless if the rumors proved true that Cassidy's title to the land was not good. Few had no desire to go to Savannah but he persuaded Richard Persse, one of the citizens of the town, to go in his stead, authorizing him to offer \$500 for ten

If Cassidy would not sell—and this indeed turned out to be the case—Few had three alternative sites to offer. Of these, he preferred site E on a tract of land south of the town which belonged to William Worley. It, too, afforded a commanding view of the whole town and the country east, north, and west. Though a bit narrow at the top, it was probably big enough to contain all the buildings that would be needed. Some buildings were there al-

ready. A good well had been dug and the owner was willing to sell ten acres for \$800 or the whole thirty-seven-acre tract for \$1,500. The plot was heavily timbered, so there would be fuel enough for the mint; the soil was fertile, so gardens should flourish. Gold might be there, too. Unhappily, it was in that part of town where the "indigent and profligate" lived. But it would do, and the owner was willing to sell. The other two sites, D and F, were less desirable. One was on land too elevated for building; the other was level enough, but Few was afraid it was not a healthy spot. All the lands next to it were being worked for gold and were marked by "large and deep pits filled with rain water, generating miasmata, the fertile source of the endemic fever of the South."2

Not until early August was the matter finally settled. Cassidy refused to sell any of his land to the mint, despite repeated pleas, so Few paid Worley \$1,050—a marked increase in the price he had quoted to officials in Washington and Philadelphia—for ten acres south of the town, complete with several small buildings. A possible contractor from Tennessee thought that brick could be made from clay found in the area, and Few had spotted a small mountain within a half-mile of the site with granite projecting from its sides. Lime could be shipped in from Gainesville, twenty-five miles away, for a modest price. After purchasing the lot, Few hired a surveyor to run the lines. By the end of the summer he was ready to advertise for bids on the building.³

A delay of five months between the passage of the bill authorizing the mint and the purchase of the site annoyed the impatient citizens of Dahlonega, and they looked for someone on whom to fix the blame. At a town meeting on 30 July the citizens drafted a vigorous protest to Secretary Woodbury, advising him of the "utter hopelessness of anything being done efficiently" by some one no more energetic than Few.

[He] is labouring under permanent ill health from rupture of the lungs his case seems hopeless & he appears conscious of it himself which makes it the more surprising that he should hold on



After the war both Reese and Azalia were very active in volunteer work most noticeably in the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary (ALA) helping veterans. By 1954, Azalia had held eight years membership in the Montevallo Hendrick-Hudson Unit 96 ALA. She served as its president for two years; Department representative, Veterans Hospital, Tuscaloosa; and President, 5th District for two years.

In the department of Alabama, she was chairman of the hospital workers at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Tuscaloosa. She organized and supervised the Sunshine Home Kitchen and the Sunshine Home Gardens for three years. The Sunshine Kitchen was a program within the VA hospital designed to let veterans cook for themselves. By allowing the patients confined to the hospital to prepare their own food, morale was raised. These two coordinating projects of Mrs. Woolley's were written up in the October, 1953, issue of the Medical Journal published in Washington, D.C., by the Veterans Administration. The article told of the many benefits for the treatment of hospitalized veterans.

Azalia Worley Woolley was accepted in 1950 by the Department Eight et Forty for achievements in the ALA. She was also a member of the 1000 Hour Club. Mrs Woolley was also a Girls State counselor for two years and completed a term as first vice president.

On July 6, 1954 she was elected State President of the ALA and served a one year term.

After her presidency, Azalia served as a National Executive Committeewoman; Secretary, Southern Division Rehabilitation Conference; President, Past Presidents Parley; Chairman, Southern Division Child Welfare Committee; Director and Associate Director, Auxiliary Junior Camp; elected to appear in 1973-74 edition "Alabama Distinguished" for contemporary achievements.

Azalia Worley Woolley established the first scholarship honoring the Alabama Department's first president. She also organized the first school camp in 1962 for the education of Junior members and has served on the Junior Camp staff for 16 years. It's programs are designed to teach Americanism, what this country stands for and the importance of volunteering. The impact of the camp has inspired five other state auxiliaries to start their own summer camp program.

Born September 10, 1807, Spartanburg, SC; died April 1, 1869, Dahlonega, GA, married Milley Donaldson June 24, 1834, Dahlonega, GA. She was born October 14, 1812 in Pickens District, SC and died August 29, 1880, Dahlonega, GA. The James H. Worley family played a

major role in all aspects of city and county life during the first 75 years of the formation of Dahlonega and Lumpkin County. They were very active in political office, military service, religious life and business ventures.

James H. Worley was the first Justice of the Peace of Dahlonega, volunteered as First Lieutenant of the Second Regiment of Georgia Volunteers in the Seminole Indian Wars (1837-38), served two terms as sheriff of Lumpkin County (1850-54), and served ten years (1856-66) as Clerk of Superior Court of Lumpkin County. Milley Donaldson was a member of the first Sunday school class of Dahlonega Methodist Church in 1835.

James H. Worley's father was William Worley. William Worley was born circa 1781 in Buckingham Co., VA the son of Silas Worley Sr who was born circa 1756 in Powhatan Co., VA. Silas Worley's father was John Worley II who was born circa 1733 the son of John Worley I who was born circa 1701 in York Co., Charles Parish, VA. Edward Worley born circa 1680 was the father of John Worley I. Just who Edward Worley's father was is unknown but is thought to be either Thomas or Loftus Worley who are considered to be the original immigrants.

William Worley sold 15 acres of land in Dahlonega in 1835 to the U.S. Government where the Mint was built and the property became a part of North Georgia College.

James H. and Milley D. Worley had six children all born in Dahlonega, four of which served in the Confederate Service. Martin Van Buren Worley was born June 28, 1835. William Lockaby Jasper Worley was born May 29, 1837. Columbus Warren Worley was born

August 21, 1840. Timothy Houston Worley was born July 31, 1842. Roxannah Susan Elizabeth Margaret Independence Worley was born July 4, 1844 and James John Hills Worley was born August 10, 1849.

James H. Worley was part owner with his brother Martin in a copper mine in Fannin County before the Civil War. In 1854 James H. Worley cosigned with his son Martin Van Buren Worley (a minor) for purchase of Lots 648 and 649 (80 acres) in Dahlonega. The following spring, April 29, 1855 Martin Van Buren Worley married Mary P. Corbin in Dahlonega. On October 22, 1855, James H. Worley received 80 acres of bounty land for his military service. William Jasper Worley married Georgia Victoria Goodrum of Blairsville, Union Co, GA in 1859.

Martin Van Buren and Columbus Warren Worley enlisted March 18, 1861 in Company H, First Regiment of Georgia Volunteers. Martin Van Buren was discharged at Monterey, VA on August 11, 1861 and Columbus Warren was mustered out April 1, 1862 at Savannah, Georgia after serving in the Virginia campaign. Martin Van Buren Worley later joined Company B of the 66th Regiment of Georgia Volunteer Infantry as First Sergeant in July 1863. He was wounded later that year and was in the hospital at Madison, GA. Columbus Warren Worley reenlisted with his brother Timothy H. Worley in April 1862 in Company D of the 52nd Georgia Regiment. Before the end of the war Columbus W. Worley was elected as First Lieutenant and Timothy H. Worley was elected Third Sergeant. Both fought in the Kentucky Campaign, captured at Vicksburg, fought at Chattanooga and the 100 days between Rocky Face and Atlanta,

Lomphia County Hartyre.

Georgia. Both were wounded at Atlanta and was forced to resign because of their wounds in late 1864. William J. Worley enlisted in Company D of the First Georgia State Volunteers (Home Guards) and served as its Captain. He fought in the battle of Atlanta.


Martin Van Buren Worley's wife, Mary Corbin Worley, remarried in October 1866 when he was reported to have died during the war. Martin Van Buren Worley recovered from his wounds and returned to Dahlonega shortly before 1870. After learning of his wife's remarriage he returned to his convalescent place and married his nurse Martha Alford. They were living in Dahlonega in 1870. Martha and Martin Van Buren Worley had eight children. He was a Methodist Minister after the war and died in 1912. He is reported to be buried in Cordova, AL.

After the war William Jasper Worley was elected Clerk of Superior Court in 1868 and held this office for eight years. He became senior

editor of the Dahlonega Signal in 1878 and served in that capacity for several years. During this time he read law under Wier Boyd and was admitted to the Lumpkin County bar in 1881. William Jasper Worley was elected Justice of the Peace, and held this office for eight years. He prospected for gold in 1888 and invested extensively in mining properties. William Jasper Worley was a charter member of the North Georgia Agricultural College and for seventeen years as secretary of the board of trustees. He died November 21, 1913 in Dahlonega. Mitz Hall Francis, the great granddaughter of William Jasper Worley bought and restored the old William J. Worley home (built in 1845) in 1982. It is now a Bed and Breakfast Inn just off the court house square.

Columbus W. Worley married Elizabeth Francis Barnes April 29, 1862 in Dahlonega just before going off to war for the second time. By early 1863 his young family was living at

Roopville, Carroll Co, GA. Columbus and Lizzie Worley raised their eleven children in Carroll County. Columbus died June 30, 1913 at Carrollton, GA. Timothy H. Worley first married Adeline J. Holland November 3, 1867 and married second Mary Adaline Crow November 21, 1872 in Dahlonega. He and Mary C. Worley raised their six children in Dahlonega. Timothy H. Worley died June 2, 1914 in Dahlonega. Roxannah Worley lived her entire life in Dahlonega and never married. She died August 12, 1902. James John Hills Worley who was too young to serve in the Civil War married Susan Elizabeth London February 2, 1873 in Dahlonega and raised their seven children in Dahlonega. The following letter from a daughter of Silas Worley, who used to reside in Dahlonega, explains itself:

Farmington, California January 24, 1905

Postmaster at Dahlonega Sir:

Will you kindly let me know at an early date if any of the old residents of Dahlonega are yet living. People who used to live there before the war--the Wimpy family in particular--archibald or his wife; Jim Worley, also his sons, were Van, William, Columbus, and Timothy. Col. Martin's family, whose daughter was Mrs. Wm P. Price. The Quillian families, one of whom, w Jeorge T. Quillian, was pastmaster for years.

I would like to hear from some of these if I find any of these living.

I left "ahlonega in 1860, a girl of 17 years, and have never been back, but hope to go soon, and inquiring of these old friends that I may know if any of them live.

Explanation of the Coat of Arms of

Che Worley Family

In heraldry ermine is the fur used denoting judgeship or a judicial position. Many think it refers in some way to royalty, but this is not true. It is as the supreme judge of the realm that the monarch uses ermine, and not in his royal capacity. It is due to the fact the ermine hated dirt of any kind and the Anglo-Saxon always believed his judge should be clean.

When ermine is one of the first livery colors given in the blazon, silver is always used in the mantling, as ermine is never used here.

Red is the color of war, danger, courage and love of adventure and combat.

Gold is the metal denoting strength, wealth and authority. Blue symbolizes truth, loyalty, honesty and happiness.

The lion, king and mightiest of beasts, is the symbol of the mighty warrior, especially in the rampant or fighting

The mural crown is used in place of the ducal or crest coronet, when the knight gained fame in the capture of a walled city.

The falchion (a kind of deadly scimitar) in the right hand shows the knight fully armed in all his power.

There is no motto to the Worley display of arms. This is due to the extreme antiquity of the grant of arms. The use of mottos for the display of arms did not come into general vogue until approximately the XIV Century. A motto was also called a slogan. This word is a combination of two Goethic words slo meaning war or battle and gan meaning cry. Hence the slogan was a battle cry or assembling cry in battle. Many families, whose arms ante-date the use of mottos, display none. Some families claim many mottos,

each arising from a different war.

The mantling or decorative matter around the shield has no especial shape, and is left to the taste and discreation of the artist. The only heraldic rule as to the mantle (also sometimes called a lambrequin) in British arms, was that it must be in the livery colors of the shield; i.e. the two first metals and-or colors mentioned in the blazon.

The mantle takes its name from a cloak or mantle which the mounted knight wore suspended from his helmet. This was to protect him, encased as he was in metal, from the summer's hot sun or the winter's snows which would have fairly cooked or frozen him as the case might be. This mantle would become cut and slashed in combat and the knight was very proud of these rents. He usually had them patched in contrasting colors to make them more noticeable.

The helmet is in profile and is of steel color as it should be. Only those who actually bear high titles are entitled to display a helmet of other metal or in other position.
